# Editori notebook.

Six years and six months ago, seven men had the idea that New England needed a sounding board to propigate square dance activities.

After very little deliberation, The New England Caller made its first appearance. The Caller was enthusiastically received and has never failed in making its monthly appearance. With the continued rise in popularity of the square dance, The Caller, too, has gained in popularity and prestige. We have had our "ups and downs", our moments of discouragement and disappointment, but on the whole, it has been wonderful.

Every wheel must have a hub with sturdy spokes. In the case of The Caller, the spokes are those wonderful correspondents who, without pay or favor, supply the news content. Also, the callers who list their dances, and the advertisers who, along with the callers, pay for advertising their dances and wares.

The hub and the spokes revolving within a terrific rim of dancers who are the subscribers to I he Caller. All wheeling together, each in their own way, helping to promote the square dance.

Of the original seven men, six are still active in The Caller organization. Al Brundage, Earle Davis, Dick Doyle, Glarence and Howard Metcalf, and yours truly Charlie Baldwin, thank each and every one who has contributed to The Caller over the past six and one-half years. Without your help and support, there would be no New England Caller.

In one breath, we thank you for past favors and in the next ask for your continued support. We need more subscribers and advertisers. Anything you can do to help will be very

much appreciated.

To make The Galler even more interesting than it already is, we plan some new innovations. Each month we will devote a page or more to the dancers, called Dancers Lament. If you have something bothering you, write in your problem and we will get someone in the know, to answer. This month a Connecticut dancer asks about the Allemande Thar. In February, we hope to start a club listing. A page, where for the very small sum of one-dollar, a club will get two lines, giving name of club, caller, location of club dance, whether meetings are open, closed, whether or not visitors are invited. The story of Ray and Claire Andersen is much the same as other callers and their wives. After taking some lessons in the fall of 1948, then dancing once a week for more than a year, Ray decided to try calling. After more than a year of practicing at home, he took a caller's course at the Y in Boston in 1951, under the direction of Charlie Baldwin. His first "one night stand" was early in 1952, and in the spring of 1952 he was privileged to call for an exhibition group at the well known "Sundays In the Park" program in Providence.

In the fall of 1952 the Cranston Y and Ray teamed together to start a regular series of dances at Eden Park School. They have just opened their sixth consecutive season at the

same place.

Ray and Claire have attended week-ends with Hogie, all but the first of the "Charlie Baldwin Camps", along with all three Atlantic Conventions, and the first Dance-A-Cade at Annapolis. They were the first to introduce a regular series of round dance instructions in R. I., and still carry on this phase of square dancing. Their attendance at camps and conventions has enabled them to receive first hand instructions on interpreting and teaching rounds, something that is, at times, a bit difficult to understand from printed instructions.

Realizing a caller must develop his own dancers, classes were started in 1953. Of the 250 or so couples taught up to this time, about 50% of them are still dancing.

In spite of a heavy schedule of classes and workshops, Ray does manage to call in the Massachusetts area, and numbers many of these dancers among his real friends. Both Claire and Ray look forward to filling as many of these dates as his schedule permits.

In the spring of 1956, Ray and Claire organized the Eden Park Hoedowners, to give their dancers the opportunity of dancing to out-of-state callers, and also to maintain the friendly feeling that is so prevalent among square dancers. Both of these purposes were well fulfilled in the first year, as evidenced by their present membership of about 100 couples.

Ray is ever mindful of the help he received in his "early" days - Hogie, Charlie Baldwin, and Dick Doyle for their sound counsel - Hank Wiley for the opportunity to "call under fire" - and Y for their uncompromising support - the many nationally known callers and leaders with whom he has talked - the many other personalities of the square dance field who have been so kind to him - and of course a wife who is wholeheartedly with him in his endeavor to give people what they want - but most of all, Ray is ever grateful for the loyal support of his dancers, without that there really would be no reason for submitting this thumb-nail story.

Dear Editor:

Would you write clarifying the call for "Allemande Thar". "Allemande Left for an Allemande Thar" - For this call, it is my understanding that the dancers always do the left allemande, go with the right hand, hold with the left hand, gents turning in for a right hand star, ladies walking forward on the rim of the star, gents backing up in the center. As a variation it is sometimes desired to turn in for the star immediately after the allemande left in which one word of the call is changed so that it is "Allemande left like an allemande thar". I have had a caller give it the first way and still turn in immediately for the star as in the second case. When I asked about it afterward, the caller was not aware of the difference himself and moreover, had a printed set of purchased dance instructions which gave it as he called it.

I believe in uniformity of calls to prevent confusion and think this is one case that needs clarification so it can be understood by all. "Confused Dancer" - Conn.

Confused Dancer has a very clear idea of Allemande Thar and I would say any trouble he has had in the past was the fault of the caller. Nevertheless, here goes....

The calls "Allemande left for an Allemande Thar" in its entirety, is an interrupted grand right and left, preceded by an Allemande Left. The word "for" is replaced with "and" and "to" by some callers which does not change the meaning or execution of the figure. "Thar" is the key word which identifies the basic figure movement.

Any shortening of the entire movement as given by Confused Dancer, generally has the word "like" incorporated in the command language. For example, gents (ladies) star right across the way, turn your opposite left like an 'Allemande Thar', followed by whom the caller wants to make the star.

break it up with a do-pas-o, partner left and corner by the right, partner left like an allemande thar, gents back up in a right hand star.

The word Thar to me means I am going to hold by the left or right and either I, or my lady of the moment, will star with the free hand. What I do previously and following depends on the call.

It is up to every caller to make his language so <u>directional</u> and <u>self-explanatory</u> that there is never any doubt in the dancers mind what is expected of him.

Most of the confusion experienced with the "Thar" is caused by inadequate language and poor timing on the part of the caller. Dear Editor:

Major League Baseball relies on Class A, B, C, D minor ball leagues, semi-pro ballplayers, college teams, American Legion, Little League and Sandlot Ball. The lower down in ability you get, the more thousands of people are involved as participants, and comparatively few are in the big leagues.

In looking at square dancing around New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and parts of New England, the whole structure is very top heavy. Square dance clubs usually are Class A, some are big league stuff. But the sandlots are not filled with square dancers -- simple one night stands, open dances that stay simple and do not go to more and more difficult dancing in many places don't exist, or people just go to watch a big league square dance. The leaders in baseball realize that the largest number of ball players don't get beyond sandlot ball, recreational baseball and softball. Do the leaders in square dancing realize this applies to square dancing? As a folk activity, it means it's for all. As soon as it becomes necessary to "give lessons" it ceases to be a genuine folk activity, and a class of people emerge. Fifty years from now the majority of square dancers, if the activity is to grow, will just be sandlot dancers, who would rather circle to left and circle right to good music than be bothered with allemande left, grand right and left.

No offense meant to the Big Leaguers, but this is important. You needn't assume most people want to go beyond sandlot square dancing. They have too many other important interests.

Curly assumes it is idiotic, but not fun, to dance privately in a caller's home after midnight. Are hunters, fishermen, star gazers, sailors, etc. all idiotic?

We have had fun dancing morning, noon, afternoon, and night in halls, barns, schools, and in parking lots and football fields.

Would it not be more constructive to make beginners and others realize that square dancing is fun, rather than to criticize those who get fun out of it?

# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

SEVEN STEPS (Siebenschritt)

Record: Folk Dancer MH 1048 German Folk Dance.
Formation: Circle of couples facing counterclockwise. Partners join inside hands, place free hands on hips.

FIG. 1: Walk forward around circle 7 steps, starting on the outside foot (man's L, lady's R). Still facing in the same direction, walk backward around circle 7 steps, starting on inside foot (man's R, lady's L).

FIG. 2: "Diamond Schottische".

- a. Starting on outside foot, take one schottische step moving away from partner and diagonally forward (man-L, R,L, hop; lady, R,L,R, hop). Then starting on inside foot, take one schottische step diagonally forward toward partner (man R,L,R, hop; lady L,R,L, hop).
- b. Take shoulder-waist position with partner (man's hands at partner's waist, hers on his shoulders) and turn once around clockwise with 4 step-hops, man starting with L foot, lady with R.







The above letter is typical of many received in the last ten days. We always have delivery trouble around the New Year and there is very little we can do about it. The following timetable concerns the January Caller:

Sent to printer Monday, Dec. 23rd. Returned for mailing on New Year's Eve, Dec. 31st. Mail at Quincy, Mass. Thurs-

day, Jan. 2, 1958.

The printer, eleven months of the year, takes four to five days for printing. Guess this year the "printer's devil" and his gang went on a toot. We know from past experience it does not pay to put the Caller in the mail until after the Christmas rush. From what happened this year, it looks as if both the Post Office Dept. and the printer conspired against us. We are very sorry it happened and sincerely hope no one was inconvenienced.

Here is the timetable for the February Caller! To the print-

er, Jan. 20th - in the mail, Jan. 27th.

Callers can help tremendously if they will list their open dances for the next succeeding week, along with their current monthly dates. Some of the callers do just that and find it

works very satisfactorily.

Have you a copy of the club directory, as compiled and printed by EDSARDA? If not, you may secure same from, Edith Murphy, 450 Main St., Bridgewater, Mass. for 10¢. It seems to me every club in N. E. should be listed, and could be if the word was passed around that the listing is free. EDSARDA sure did a fine job compiling and printing the directory in such a short time since organizing. "More power to them."

The club directory prompts me to write, in answer to many, the function and reason for many of our clubs. Clubs are organized for various and sundry reasons. Strange as it may seem, clubs function differently, almost on a county basis in some areas.

Many clubs are organized solely for the purpose of sponsoring square dances in the manner they deem fit. These clubs are found in areas where square dancing has been in existence beyond the memory of anyone now alive. By mod-

#### GRANT and MARION LONGLEY

Callers and dancers alike have been introduced to square dancing in many and various ways. Grant (affectionately called "Prof") and Marion Longley went to Los Banos, California in June of 1951 to head up a summer recreation program. There they found a very active folk and square dance group that had been having lessons for two years under the California Adult Education program. Being the director of the Recreation Program, Prof offered administrative assistance to the group in obtaining dance slabs for their weekly outdoor dances, and in return, they invited Marion & Grant to dance with them. The Longleys thus started the hard way, no previous dance experience, and immediately ran into allemande thars, red hot, etc. the first nite.

They came back to Mass. after ten weeks of trying the patience of their Californian friends, determined to locate some square dancing in New England. Finally, they discovered Squire and Dick Davis and proceeded to attend some of the Do-Si-Doers dances where they met Charlie Baldwin

on a "busman's holiday".

The following summer, the Longleys again headed west and enjoyed dancing with the Pacheco Promenaders with a little more assurance. At the end of the summer, Prof made a promise to the California club that he would return the following summer and teach them some of the New England contras (which he had learned to enjoy with Squire).

Upon arrival at home, Prof wrote to Charlie Baldwin to ask him how to learn to call contras. It was then that he discovered that in order to call contras he should also know how to call squares. This prompted Prof to immediately enroll in Charlie's caller class, and he started calling in

the spring of 1953.

At present, Prof is in his second term as President of Old Colony Callers' Assn. He is the only president to have served in this capacity for two terms. Prof is also serving his fourth year as secretary of the Northeastern Folk and Square Dance Callers', Leaders', and Teachers' Conference.

Last year, Prof was the Director of the Childrens' program at the N. E. Folk Festival in Exeter, N. H. This year he has been named chairman of the Educational Committee of the newly formed EDSARDA, after being on the original steering committee that formed the new organization.

A year ago, Prof and Marion formed the Grant Squares, a club with 45 members from 12 different towns. Prof served

as the first president as well as the club caller.

The Longleys are well-known for their work with children's programs. Besides meeting 500 to 600 children a week during the fall for classes, the Longleys have directed the childrens' program at the New England Square & Folk Dance Camp in Becket, Mass, for four years.

Prof has been the director of athletics at Dean Academy and Junior College in Franklin, Mass. for the past eighteen years. Here he coaches soccer, lacrosse and swimming as well as being an instructor in Psychology, Anatomy, and Physiology.

ern standards, many of these open dances operating over the years have degenerated into rough houses. Dancers imbibing in alcohol, and other practices frowned on by the present day dancer. Folks who liked to square dance but disliked rough house tactics, etc., have organized to control admission. Some of these clubs sponsor classes, have a few officers with an executive committee or board of directors to keep the dances going. If you grade dancing by levels, many of these clubs would not qualify as high level. They sponsor orderly dances where anyone with the knowledge of the square dance fundamentals can enjoy themselves. These dances are generally labeled open.

In some places, the above mentioned club is the sole reason

for present day square dance activity.

Probably the most controversial club is the closed club, where admission is by membership only; the exception, a guest of a member who practically guarantees the visitor/s a good dancer. This type of club is generally organized for the puspose of workshop and high level dancing. Perhaps better said, where the more complicated figures are worked out. Folks who belong to this type of club can be generally found Saturday nights at the open dances, enjoying themselves, dancing with everyone, without any thought of the level of the dance. Due to the fact that they can execute the most complicated of figures, they are quite noticeable at an open dance due to the smoothness and enthusiasm with which they execute the simpler figures. The workshop type of club gives the caller a chance to try out dances and figures he otherwise would never be able to perfect.

There are a few clubs organized strictly on a friendship and dance level basis. These requirements, of course, make the club exclusive, but you have to grant everyone the right to choose their own friends and the type of dancing they prefer. It has been said this type of club is no asset to the square dance. Well, time will prove that true or false.

The trend today is toward the club. If a town or area has had no square dancing, and suddenly some spark plug starts the ball rolling, you can be sure within a year a club will be

formed.

Square dancing is intended to draw people together. To enable one to enlarge their circle of friends through a particular type of recreation. If the exclusive club ever prevails, kiss square dancing goodbye. But as long as we have clubs along with the open Saturday night dance where folks can gather of their own choosing, the square dance will live forever.

# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

SPINNRADL

Austrian couple dance as taught by Vyts Beliajus.

Record: Zither Melodies AH 1897

Formation: Circle of couples facing counterclockwise. Varsouvienne position (man holding partner's raised hands and standing slightly behind and to her left.)

Step: Flat-footed Laendler-type peasant waltz, done through-

out the dance.

Music Fig. 1. a. With 6 steps (2 waltz steps), lady moves across in front of partner to his L side, both continuing to face counter-clockwise around circle.

(4 meas.) In 6 more steps, lady moves back in same way to R side of partner.

Meantime, the man takes small steps in place, using every opportunity to flirt with his partner. b. Same hand-hold. Lady waltzes forward in front

B of partner around the circle, turning head from (4 meas) side to side to look back at him. (12 steps).

Fig. 2. Same hand-hold. Man, dancing in place and keeping their joined hands high, leads lady across in front of him, then behind him, turning her once

(4 meas) counter-clockwise under their joined hands to face him as she again reaches the outside of the circle. (12 steps).

Fig. 3. a. Man, with back to center of circle, turns

B partner once clockwise under their joined hands,

(4 meas) as both progress slightly, counterclockwise, around

circle. (6 steps)

b. Man similarly turns counterclockwise under their joined hands as they continue moving slowly counterclockwise around circle. (6 steps).

(4meas.) Repeat Figure 3.

Fig. 4. a. Joined hands are dropped down in front of B partners in skating position, with partners now (4 meas) side by side again. Move forward counterclockwise

around circle. (6 steps).
b. Girl casts off (turns out to her R) to gent behind.

b. Girl casts off (turns out to her R) to gent behind. (6 steps).

Whole dance is repeated with new partner. The charm of this dance lies in the smooth continuous flow of one figure into the next and the feeling of gliding almost in a dream to the lovely melody.

Note on December's dance: A card from Ed Kremers, San Francisco, says that the Columbia record 10072, which is still in common use by Boston folk dance leaders for Misirlou, is out of print. In place of it he recommends Standard T-121, which is the same tune and dance arrangement but without the vocal. He says other acceptable records of the same tune are Liberty 78 and Kolo Festival 804. Thanks a lot for the information, Ed, and for your interest in our dance problems here on the other side of the continent. Such help-





At none of these dances is a beginner ever given his money back and told where to go to take lessons, as so shockingly described in the recent Worcester Gazette article which has been so widely discussed. The spirit of that article is just the opposite of the friendly, democratic recreation for all which square dancing in America has always been. We are thankful that around Boston beginners can find so many open dances (joyously attended by skilled dancers and novices alike) that the only problem is in deciding which ones to attend.

We feel that the attitude demonstrated in the Worcester Gazette article could do square dancing even more harm in the eyes of the non-dancing public than the activities of the Idiots which so annoy Curly. 





I consider myself an average square dancer and think that I do pretty well out on the floor, but I am one of those people that seem to have two left feet when it comes to rounds. This is no reason for me to deny other people pleasure, but it seems to me that as square dance clubs we are taking too much time during the evening to do dances that so many of us are unable to do gracefully or don't have the time to learn them. I wonder if I am alone in my thoughts.

Dear Editor:

Don't you think it is about time we straightened out callers and dancers on the call allemande thar. You had on explanation in the January Caller that only tended to add fuel to the fire in our area.


In my opinion the words to, for, or like don't make one bit of difference. They are only incidental and have nothing to do with directional calling.

The whole controversy revolves around whether the caller

says allemande left or not.

If the call allemande left is given first the allemande thar will be of the interupted grand right and left variety. If the call is not allemande left, but just turn her left or catch her left, etc., then the allemande thar would be formed right then.

In my opinion allemande left is a complete call in itself and must be followed by another call. Should that call be allemande than then the dancers will go right and left and then form the star. Without the call allemande left the star forms at the point of the callers choosing. Earl Johnston



# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

NEDA GRIVNE

Yugoslav Line Dance

Record: Folk Dancer MH 1013

Formation: Single circle, no partners. Hands joined and held straight down. As in most Yugoslav dances, the dancers hold themselves very proudly erect.

Music

8

1. All face to R in circle. Starting on R foot, take
7 fairly rapid steps, moving to R (counterclockwise)
counts
around circle. On count 8, all face center, keeping

weight on R foot, L foot free.

 Take 2 slow steps (L, hold, R, hold) toward cencounts ter of circle.

4 3. Take 3 steps more rapidly (L,R,L, hold) backing counts out of center again.

4. Still facing center, step sideward to R on R foot.

Bring L foot to join it ("close L"), but keeping weight on R; step sideward to L on L foot, close R, keeping weight on L. Here, as throughout the dance, avoid scuffing the feet. (We used to think this went without saying in most folk dancing, including American squares and contras, but recently many folks seem to need a reminder).

Repeat whole dance again and again. As soon as the dancers have mastered the pattern, the leader may drop hands with the person on his R and lead the line, serpentine fashion, all over the hall in any gyrations his fancy dictates — even out one door and in another. This is the simplest kolo we've found but a lot of fun to do. It is enjoyed by children, teenagers, and adults alike, and is an easy, lively, ice-breaker for a one-night stand. Like most kolos, it also has the advantage of taking care of uneven numbers of men and women.

Clarification of last month's description of Jandals: In Fig. 3, when the head C's (and later the sides) join hands with partners and take 4 slides toward the center, they raise their leading hands (i. e., man's L and lady's R) higher with each slide in, lowering hands again during the 4 slides out. The trailing hands (man's R and lady's L) are not raised.



# Editors notebook.

Dear Earle:

In reply to your letter in the April Caller, personally, I was not aware that dancers were having trouble with the abreviated Allemande Thar, until I read the letter in the Jan. Caller, signed, Confused Dancer.

I answered the letter to the best of my ability, as to my understanding of the figure which I have been using since 1947-48. Before the figure was named Allemande Thar, follows the way I called it, (as arranged by Marjorie Mac Donald, W. Bridgewater, Mass.): "Do-si-do your corner, right hand by your sweet, a left and just three quarters round, star, balance on the beat." Note it started with a Do-si-do and ended with a step swing balance, in place of "allemande left" and "boys back up." The call was primarily directed to the men, especially as to who makes the star following a left hand three quarter turn, which put the men in the center and the ladies on the outside. In those days we did not dance as many breaks as today and the figure was always called as described above, consequently, no confusion in the dancers mind.

If there is any area of confusion concerning the language of the Allemande Thar, I agree with you, it had best be straightened out right away. I suggest it would make a good project for the Standardization Committee of any Callers Assn.

March 1st, I had the pleasure of calling for your Vernon, Conn. club. Using the language as printed in the Jam. 1958 Caller, I called various breaks, incorporating the Allemande Thar and the dancers understood exactly what I wanted them to do and they executed it to perfection. Have Fun. C.B.

Here's my response to "Bewildered" in the April Caller. May I discuss your problem from two angles and then put them together?

1. Three tips - Too many square thrus, pass thrus, dive thrus and right and left thrus (which seem necessary for today's dancers) shatter my brain and leave my legs numb after two tips - but give me one round to dance and one round to rest and I'm ready for cross-trail to the Ole Red Hot.

2. Two left feet for rounds - Have you tried round dance lessons with a round dance teacher (as compared with trying to learn a round at a dance or from friends who catch on quickly to rounds)? In this area, south of Boston, we are fortunate in having Dick and Evelyn Doyle, and Freddie and Georgie Bunker as teachers "extraordinaire". In their classes they have that other left foot so that it is right. A series of lessons in round dancing will do as much as a series of lessons in square dancing and from then on it is up to one's interest as to how much they progress.

Also Edsarda's Quarterly Round Dance Suggestion Program (which has been sent to every club) is very useful as it designates dances as "rounds for square dancers" and "rounds

for round dancers."

To bring these two points together - it is usually up to the caller, since he is the MC, to see that the majority of the floor is having a good time. He will "go with the crowd" and the custom of the area. In a club, two or three tips could be settled by club policy.

This seems to be a good discussion to bring before the Edsarda Seminar on May 17th in Holyoke and May 18th in E. Bridgewater. Why not bring it up then? Squarely, BEWITCHED

Dear Editor:

I feel it necessary to answer some recent comments made by a club reporter in your March issue of the Caller.

First of all I'm afraid that there is some misconception with regard to the so called Advanced Dancer. Just what is an advanced dancer? In my opinion he is one who can and does attend every level of square dance, beginner, intermediate and advanced. He is one who dances smoothly and effortlessly to any caller, beginner or advanced, one who enjoys a variety of dances, whether it be filled with the latest in square dance figures or the oldest and simplest of the square dance movements.

If you look back at square dancing to some years ago you will see the enormous strides we have taken. Due to the monotony of the calls at that time square dancing had retreated almost to oblivion. It was still enjoyed by a few but known to even fewer. Then suddenly new figures and new callers came along to give it the shot in the arm it definitely needed. The graduates then went out to dance and learn. One thing the advanced dancer never stops doing, is learning.

There is always something new, or old, to learn.

It's true that some prefer to go so far then stop, however, why should the advanced dancer be picked on simply because he wants to go ahead and broaden his outlook, because his love of square dancing leads him on to explore every facet of it. The knowledge that he passes on to the beginners, and he does work with the beginner because he knows they are the future of square dancing, is as the traditions a Father passes on to his son. The old and the new together make square dancing what it is today. Also let me point out that anyone can become bored with the same dances week after week. The enthusiasm of the beginner, not only the advanced dancer, can die without the variety it needs in calls and callers.

Another point I'd like to make is this: unlike the beginner dancer who is content to dance to the same caller week after week the advance dancer is out looking for new people, new callers, and new dances to try out. He reads the Caller faithfully, is interested in what the other dancers and clubs are doing, who is calling for them and when. He meets and hears callers from all over the country, his viewpoint is always expanding, his interest and knowledge increasing. He keeps square dancing on the move and spreads the word so to speak, he is, in my opinion, the best advertisement we have.

However, there is room for all and I would suggest a little more tolerance for those who don't happen to see things the way we do. Consideration and understanding are a necessary part of the square dance picture of today. The main objectives of square dancing are enjoymeni, companionship, and relaxation, so let's live up to the saying that "Square dancers are the friendliest people in the world." Be friendly and understanding with one another, give the other guy the benefit of the doubt.

#### NEW HAMPSHIRE FOLK FESTIVAL

The 13th annual N. H. Folk Festival will be held on Sat. May 24th at Pembroke Academy on Rte. 3, north of Manchester, 3 miles south of Concord, N. H. Two halls will be available for continuous programs throughout the day, starting at 10 AM with a Contra Workshop. Ralph Page of Keene, foremost New Hampshire contra caller, will present some different contras and also some old favorites. This session will be an appropriate opening for a New Hampshire festival where contras are traditional.

In the afternoon from 1 to 4 PM Charlie Baldwin of Norwell, Mass. will teach squares and modern rounds in one hall while the children's program goes on in the other hall.

There will also be a session with Ed and Winifred Taylor of Kittery, Maine from 4 to 5:30 PM on Folk Dancing.

In the evening, from 8 to 11 PM, there will be demonstrations, specialty numbers, folk singing, and lots of good dancing with New Hampshire callers and musicians.

There will be exhibits and demonstrations of crafts going on all day.

#### AROUND BOSTON

The fourteenth annual N. E. Folk Festival is now in the books, after between 2500 and 3000 people enjoyed for three days all the varied and joyous experiences this Festival always provides. Fri., April II, was one of the most miserable nights, weatherwise, in Festival history, with snow, hail, sleet, rain, and slush to discourage all but about 500 of the most ardent dancers, but the weatherman relented and sent a mere drizzle on Sat., so Cousens Gym at Tufts was jammed to the rafters both afternoon and evening, while a sunny Sun, brought another large turnout for the 1:30 to 6:30 workshop for members.

The programs at the four sessions were substantially as forecast in the Caller last month. Callers for general dancing, in addition to those named then, were Dick Steele, Dud Laufman, John Trafton, Duke Miller, Abe Kanegson, and Harold Mattson. Leaders of the general folk dancing were Barney Priest, Ted Sannella, Jean and Arthur Tufts, Conny and Marianne Taylor, Maryann Herman, and Rivkah Sturman. Folk dance groups we hadn't told you about included Armenian, Spanish and East Indian, while additional American square and contra demonstrations were presented by children's groups from Brattleboro and Manchester, Vt., a family group from Springfield, Mass., and an adult group from Boston.

One of the most delightful parts of the Festival is always the Sat. afternoon session, at which it is fascinating for the adults to watch the surprising skill of the children's demonstration groups (the timiest of the Lithuanian dancers was only 3 1/2 years old), and the obvious excitement and joy of the hundreds of youngsters attending their first Festival and so enchanted by it all that they hardly know where to look or what to do next. Far from the bedlam one might expect at such a gathering, the children were extremely orderly, another proof of the statement that busy, interested children are also happy and well-behaved ones. Most of them are already finding it hard to wait for next year's Festival, which is expected to be again at Tufts College on Apr. 24-6, 1959.

The annual Highland Ball of the Scottish CDS was held on Fri., March 21, in the ballroom of the Sheraton Plaza in Boston. No Scots could enjoy such an evening without their bagpipes, of course, so a pipe band led the grand march, while a Scottish country dance orchestra from Toronto played for the ballroom and Scottish country dancing. An exhibition of Scottish country and highland dancing included Braes of Balquhidder, General Stuart's Reel, and Macneil of Barra. The Macneil of Barra was on hand to see and approve the presentation of the dance from his island in the Hehrides.

Johnny Trafton's Crystal Hills weekend at Intervale, N. H., March 28-30, turned out to be a smashing success for this able and affable young caller. Between 60 and 70 people enjoyed skiing and skating during the day, then danced at night to the calling of Johnny, Dick Castner, Dud Laufman, and Charlie Webster, while Conny and Marianne Taylor led the

Those who are interested in the ways in which different areas and peoples have used the same basic square dance figures to create delightfully different versions of the dance will enjoy the current issue of Northern Junket (Vol. 6 No.3) which is devoted to some typical square and couple dances of the Maritime Provinces of Canada, Ralph Page, Junket editor, plans a similar issue next month on the square dances of Quebec. Ed Durlacher's article in the same issue merits thoughtful reading by callers and dancers alike. It may well prove important to the future of our whole square dance movement. 
#### PALMER SQUARE DANCE CLUB



# Let's Learn a folk Dance

ROAD TO THE ISLES British Couple Dance

Record: Folkraft 1416

Couples in Varsouvienne position. (Man to L and slightly

behind partner, holding her raised hands).

PART 1: Both start with L foot. Point L toe forward. Move sidewards away from center of circle with 3 steps; L foot in back of R, R foot to side, L foot forward

8 in front of R. Point R toe forward.

counts Move sidewards toward center of circle with 3 steps: R foot in back of L, L foot to side, R foot

8 forward in front of L. Point L toe forward, then

counts point L toe back near R. heel.

PART 2: Take 3 steps forward - L,R,L. On 4th count, rise 4 cts. on ball of L foot (a slight, low hop).

Take 3 more steps forward - R,L,R. Rise on ball of R foot, and without dropping hands, man and lady

4 cts. each turns clockwise in place on ball of R foot (lady now on L of partner and still on outside of circle) to face in opposite direction.

Take 3 steps in the new direction - L,R,L. Rise on 4 cts. ball of L foot and turn again, counterclockwise, to face original direction, still retaining original

handhold.

4 cts. Take 3 steps forward - R,L,R. Hold 4th count. Repeat dance from the beginning.

For the past ten years or so, this has been one of the most popular and widely known folk dances all over New England. The music is a Scottish folk tune, the dance a more dignified version of the rather rowdy English Palais Glide. It was brought to the United States by some Scottish sailors and has spread rapidly throughout the country. It is danced in the style of Scottish and English dances; that is, with neat precise steps and without body sways, stamping, or fancy twirls. It has been the source of many of the modern American round dances, but with its lilting music and its simple, clean straightforwardness of figure it seems thus far to have outlasted them all and promises to be with us for many years to come.

The transition will be slow and gradual, but in the meantime the caller will be inconvenienced. Suggest that as you are forced to replace your old standards, due to wear and breakage, try to get them on 45 rpm. We have heard many gripes from different callers about the changeover, but in the long run everyone will benefit, and most of all, the caller's wife, who many times is stuck with the job of carrying the records, while husband caller carries the p.a. system.

The next change will be the perfection of the use of transistors in public address systems. When transistors become practical, size and weight of p.a. systems will be drastically reduced. What a relief that will be. With 45 rpm records and a transistor p.a. system a caller will be able to get by with a Volkswagen for transportation. That is, if the ladies do something about their petticoats. Have Fun....C. B.

WAG-N-WHEELERS



#### "NEW LOOK" IN RECORDS

According to word received from Corsair-Continental Corp., national representative for fourteen record producers, most of the square and round dance record manufacturers plan to shift to 45 rpm records as soon as possible. The trend toward these smaller and more popular discs has been followed by nearly all other types of producers during the past several years, leaving the square and round dance market virtually alone in the use of the outmoded and cumbersome 78 rpm speed and ten inch size.

With the advent of the new "hot point" technique of cutting masters, the former problems of skipping and groove damage are reduced to a minimum. The use of Westrex and Grampion recording heads attains excellent tonal qualities, perfect tracking and a high sound level in the new 45's. Corsair states that 45's weigh only 30% as much as 78's and require only 50% as much storage space. They wear longer, due to the slower speed, and are much less fragile than 78's.

Dancers, callers and teachers should enjoy the convenience, quality and compactness of the smaller discs, and we understand that no increase in price is expected.

#### CALLING TO LIVE MUSIC

This article is written for the purpose of helping callers who have not had the opportunity to study music or play a musical instrument.

Sooner or later, every caller will be asked to call a square dance to live music. You don't have to be a musician to be a caller, but you should know some things about music, that are essential, and will not take much effort to learn.

The most important, of course, is the keys for every singing call you have. If you don't know them then do something about it now. Get a piano player who knows music, even if you have to hire one, have a list of all your singing calls, and as fast as you call them the piano player will he able to tell you the key so that you can write it down beside the title of your call. Carry a copy of this list with you whenever you think you may be called upon to call a square dance, or a tip to live music. The orchestra will play with more confidence when they know the melody is in the key you want.

One of the most important things, in fact the first thing you should learn is - what is your highest comfortable note. (Don't be too concerned about your lowest note.) A musician can find your highest note in less than a minute. Anything as important as this is surely worth a minute of your time. Why is it so important? Well, for example, let us assume that your highest note is C and at the time, that was all you knew. This is what it will do for you. When you tell the orchestra leader that your highest note is C, but that you don't know what key you call in, then the orchestra leader can find a key for yon very quickly that will not reach above C. Remember this is only a temporary method until you find the key for every singing call you do.

Most records today have a key signature written on the label. If it's a comfortable key for you, than write it down on

your pocket list of calls.

In future issues we will explain, the best way we know how, what the caller should know about singing calls with live music. We will try to point it out gradually as to not give you more than you can find time to learn. This is written with the knowledge that, as paid callers, we owe it to the dancers to improve to the limit of our ability every call. We never will know too much. Let me leave you with this warning. The caller had better not:

Guess the key he wants.

Leave it to the musicians to decide what key. Call any singing call that may have - a special

introduction - breaks - tags or special endings without first explaining it to the orchestra leader.

In the meantime, we would appreciate hearing from any caller that may have music problems that can't wait for future issues. They will be answered personally if so desired. If we don't know the answer, we will find it for you.



# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

TOTUR

Record: Folk Dancer MH 1021 Danish Circle Mixer Introduction: Couples in a circle, facing the center, hands joined at shoulder height with elbows bent: Walk to the left 16 steps, then to the right 16 steps (a light walking step—avoid shuffling). This introduction is not done again in the dance.

FIG. 1: a. Take partner in slightly open ballroom position, joined hands pointing toward center of circle. Move to center with a two-step, followed by 2 walking steps, as follows: man starts on L foot, lady on R. Man steps forward L, brings R to L, steps forward L; then walks forward R, L. Lady does same on opposite feet. Both move backward away from center, in same way, starting on man's R, lady's L foot: step-rogether-step, walk, walk.

b. In ballroom position, do 4 two-steps turning clockwise but moving (slightly) counterclockwise around room, finish-

ing to face center. Repeat a, and b.

whole field of folk dancing.

FIG. 2: Face partner, do a grand right and left, hands held at approximately shoulder level, and with a smile for each person you meet. At the end of this section of the music, meet new partner and do Fig. 1 again. If, as may happen, some do not meet a partner at once, "lost and found" go to

the middle and couple up. Extra men or women may join in the dance during the grand right and left, and in this case the new extras wait out one turn of Fig. 1 in the center.

This is another of the many simple, popular Danish dances, like Ace of Diamonds, Danish Family Circle, and Toting, all of which have been described in this column. The music of these dances fits the figures so completely, and both have such a gay and infectious friendliness, that they are very useful to callers on one-night-stands or to introduce the

Through an oversight, only one of three record numbers for "Road to the Isles" was listed in the Caller last month. The others are Folk Dancer 3003 and MacGregor 728. We use the Folk Dancer and have not heard the others, but the new Folkraft recording has been highly recommended to us, and we're told that the MacGregor is played by bagpipes, sometimes more difficult for non-Scots to get used to dancing to, but certainly giving the dance the right flavor.



# Editors notebook

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD

The Belles and Beaus of Weymouth, Mass, are planning to climax their two years of existence on Friday, June 27th by hosting the graduating class of caller, Howard Sherman. This most recent class has been a highly successful one and the Belles and Beaus expect to enroll many of the graduates into the club. (This latter consideration brings to mind a communique issued by EDSARDA inviting club correspondents to submit suggestions on How to Get New Members and How to Keep the Old Ones from Dropping Out).

A square dance club which sponsors regularly scheduled classes will enroll new members at the conclusion of each series of classes if (1) the club members actively assist the class teacher by a studied distribution of their talents amongst the newcomers at every lesson and (2) if application to the club is regarded as a form of prize to be won by the new square dancers and (3) if graduates are asked to join and (4) it is made apparent that the level of dancing enjoyed by the club at its regular meetings is not beyond the ability of the graduating class. Thus far so good and thus far a truism borne out by our, The Belles and Beaus, experience.

The second problem, i.e., How to Keep the Older Members from Dropping Out, is one not so easily disposed of. There is a popular estimate concerning the length of time which the average square dancer may be expected to be actively interested; some put it at three years and others suggest a five year expectancy. These are generalities, of course, and are derived from no serious social study. Only one thing is certain, the influx of new members into a club, any club, will be partially offset by a dropping out of the older, more tired members. Square dancing as an organized diversion is too new a phenomenon on the American scene to reveal much more about it. We are acquainted with its satisfactions, its advantages, but its limitations have not yet been carefully weighed.

I think we may admit that as long as romance, courtship, and matrimony remain the private concern of a couple, i.e., one boy and one girl, then square dancing which depends on a group of eight people with a mixture of identities, will have little appeal to the romance-courtship-matrimony age level. That age and its thrills and problems are behind most men and women who become interested in square dancing. At the other extreme old age brings with it its informities and ailments and thus reduces the field from which square dancers are drawn. In the middle age bracket we may attract recruits if (1) the prospective couple are more or less compatible and domesticated, and (2) possess a rudimentary sense of rhythm, and (3) are free to devote themselves to a new activity. The more one examined the requirements, the more limited our field becomes.

Then when we consider the sometimes devastating effect of the inevitable disagreements and quarrels which arise in the life of a club and which are often inflated all out of proportion, and the mishaps and changes in fortune suffered by all people and affecting square dancers as much as anyone, then we may understand that losing our "older members" is not a problem with a solution to be expected. It is a natural erosion which may be checked and minimized but which we can never expect to stop. If we accept it on this basis and count on it statistically, then we can stop our fretting about losing members and concentrate on gaining new ones.

The election of officers in our club at our May meeting resulted in the following elected slate: Ray David, President; Penny Nichols, Vice-Pres.; Emma Rizzotto, Secretary; Fred Cowles, Treasurer; and Henry Marshman, Norm Garland, Bud Kelso, Board of Directors.

Jim and Mi riam Chandler volunteered to serve as the Hospitality Committee and A. Van Schyndel desired the correspondent's post.

The newly installed officers voted to hold the regular monthly meetings of the Belles and Beaus on the fourth Friday of the month at the clubhouse of the Weymouth Sportsmens Club. Plans are under way for a July meeting on the grounds of Howie and Dora Sherman in Plymouth with outdoor cooking (and eating) and dancing scheduled thus far.

# LETTERS

EDITOR.

Dear Editor: As one who has watched the N. E. Folk Festival develop for the full 14 years of its history, I'd like to answer Dan Foley's letter in the June issue of the Caller. For the first 9 years of the Festival, all activities were carried on in the main hall. Then a second hall was opened, as an experiment, for continuous dancing. After 4 years' trial, this was reluctantly abandoned this year because of various problems it had created. It was a very difficult decision for the Exec. Board to make, since, as in most controversial matters. there is much to be said on both sides. To make up to a certain extent for dropping this second hall, general dancing time was greatly extended in the main hall. There was an hour and a half of general dancing each session before the program of demonstrations began (except on Friday night, when snow, sleet, hail, ice, and all other difficulties the weatherman could hurl at the Festival delayed its opening from 6:30 to 8, and cut the general dancing before the demonstrations to 45 minutes). In addition, the program included two 15-minute general dance sessions during the demonstrations and another half hour at the end of each session. 2 1/2 hours of general dancing each session or (if the Friday night weather had behaved ) 7 1/2 hours at the 3 sessions, plus another 5 hours of uninterrupted general dancing at the Sunday workshop. I don't know about Mr. Foley, but by Sunday night my feet were sore and I was mighty glad to sit down. On checking the program, I found that I had danced to 27 of N. E.'s finest callers and leaders, certainly as many as I could absorb "style and new techniques" from in three days. As to the demonstrations being a "variety show", I'm afraid Mr. Foley has missed the purpose of this Festival. which is more than just a show or a callers' jamboree. Its purpose is to present, encourage, and preserve all types of folk dancing found in the N. E. area - not only our American folk dances, which are of course the squares and contras, but also the folk dances of other nationalities represented in the region. These are best presented as demonstrations rather than as general dancing, largely hecause to acquire the style and knowledge to do the dances of each country properly would require more time than a short weekend allows. (Did you acquire the skills and style of our own American folk dancing in one weekend?) Other folk arts encouraged at the Festival include the folk songs, arts and crafts, and foods of our own and other lands. It's a pretty ambitious program very competently carried through, and if Mr. Foley thinks of it as a mere variety show or as a TV show like Ozark Jubilee, which presents only a small segment of one facet of this picture, and that rather sadly commerciallized - well, it seems that Mr. Foley has just failed to appreciate what has been presented to him. Hope he will come back next year and view proceedings from a slightly OUISE WINSTON different angle







The instructors were teaching a step forward and back type of balance, which isn't much fun, to my way of thinking. Bernie Kosnick from Chicago, did a highly commendable job of teaching folk dancing, and we came back with many new dances that can be taught to beginners or more experienced dancers. He also did a good job of teaching Petronella and Haymaker's Jig to the class under adverse conditions. And with the so-called New England balance, yet. Bernie has sort of promised to come to the New England Recreation Leaders Lab in 1959 and teach folk dancing there.

Meanwhile, plans are all made for the 1758 N. E. Lab to be held at Camp Pinnacle, Lyme, N. H., Aug. 29 to Sept. 1 (see ad elsewhere in Caller). Rod Linnell will be conducting classes for callers, and square dancing sessions. Phil Merrill, from the Country Dance Society in N. Y. will have folk dancing classes at the Lab, and will assist with music. You haven't heard music until you have heard Phil play his accordian for dancing. Larry Eisenberg will be back again this year to do games, skits and stunts, song leadership, etc. He usually teaches a few Southern Mountain dances at impromptu sessions and will likely run through some of the World of Fun series. Further information is available from Ardis Stevens, Lab Registrar, Chester, Vt. Registration blanks and a copy of the program will be sent upon request. See you all at the Festival in Amberst. 



- 5-8 BALANCE BACK; WALTZ A QUARTER; WALTZ A QUARTER; SIDE, DRAW, -; Balance back on L and touch R. to L; Starting R waltz 1/4 turn R so gent is facing RLOD, then waltz 1/4 turn R again so gent is facing center of hall and end facing partner with his R and her L joined; step side on R in LOD and draw L to R ending in open position both facing RLOD weight in his R and her L;

9 - 16 REPEAT meas, 1-8 moving RLOD end closed position, gents back to cepter of hall;

- 17-20 WALTZ A QUARTER; BACK, (pivot) SIDE, CROSS; STEP, SWING,-; STEP, SIDE, CLOSE; In one waltz meas, turning L face 1/4 end gent facing LOD; the gent steps back on R in RLOD pivoting 1/4 L face to face center steps on L to side in RLOD, steps on R across in front of L turning 1/4 L face into semi-closed position (the lady takes 3 steps forward and slightly to the R to end in semi-closed position); step forward RLOD on L and swing R forward; step R in RLOD turning 1/4 to face partner, step L to side RLOD and close R to L ending closed position, gent facing center;
- 21-24 BALANCE BACK; ROLL AWAY; TWINKLE; HOOK TURN; Balance back on L toward wall; A 3 step roll gent turning R face and lady L face moving LOD (to gent's R) to end facing with his L and her R hands joined, gent's back to wall; both crossing in front, twinkle (cross L over R, step R to side LOD and close L to R ending semi-closed facing RLOD (turning toward partner on last step) the gent steps R across in front of L and with weight on both feet pivots 1/2 L face while leading the lady around him in 3 steps to end semi-closed fac. LOD;

# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

OIGE JA VASEMBA

Record: Folk Dancer MH 3007 Estonian Circle Dance Formation: 6 to 8 couples in a circle. (Can be done with more or fewer, but works best for about this number). FIG. 1. Walk to L 16 steps, swinging joined hands in and out and singing la, la or other such Estonian lyrics. FIG. 2. Send ladies to the center, where they join hands and circle L, with elbows bent to keep circle small, while the men join hands in the outside circle, arms outstretched, and circle R. (16 steps.)

FIG. 3. Men bring joined hands over ladies' heads to make a basket, and all walk 16 steps to L around the circle. FIG. 4. Gent faces lady now on his R to do a grand R. and L

(16 steps).

Repeat dance from the beginning.

The most difficult part of this dance is its name, which we are told means "Rights and Lefts". It will frequently happen in forming the basket that two ladies will end up in the same "hole" between two men, with no lady between the next two men. Don't let it worry you and don't bother to try to correct it, for which there usually isn't time. This mixup only adds to the fun. Just break out into the grand right and left after 16 counts and the situation will correct itself. If it happens that there are two men or two ladies together in the circle following the grand right and left, this doesn't matter, either, as everything straightens out nicely when the ladies go to the center again. When, after a little practice folks find the basket working out perfectly, the glee at their own cleverness (or luck) adds further to the fun of this very jolly and extremely sociable little dance. 


On June 19th a graduation party and dance was held for a new class just completing a ten lesson course under the competent instruction of Jim Mayo, of Nashua, N. H.





#### SETTING THE TEMPO

As a caller will study a figure before he learns the words, and learn his key before he tells the orchestra, so must he learn to set the dance tempo before he calls the dance.

It is the caller and not the orchestra that sets the tempo. An orchestra leader would set a tempo best suited for the music, but, it is the caller who decides what tempo is best for the particular dance figure he is using, therefore, it is very important that callers learn to set the tempo.

If you want to set a tempo, hum the melody to yourself while beating time with your foot. It won't take more than ten seconds to find the tempo that you feel is right. Face the orchestra and tell them you are ready to start the dance, then beat off 2 beats with your foot, (loud enough for the orchestra to hear), and they will pick up the tempo from you. If at times the tempo seems slow when they start, remember that all singing calls have, or should have, a four measure introduction (eight beats) and as you gain experience, you will be able to increase or slow down the tempo during the introduction so that the dance will go on without interuption.

Now, if it does become necessary to increase the tempo during the dance, and at times it will, try this -- hold your hand out with the palm up, it will be a signal to the orchestra that you are going to increase the tempo, move your hand to the tempo that they are playing then increase the tempo very slowly, so as not to disturb the dancing. When you have the right tempo, just drop your hand.

If you know an orchestra leader, ask him to teach you how to beat off a tempo, also, watch any leader beat off a tempo,

it will help you.

This will not make you an orchestra leader, by any stretch of the imagination, but it will help you to set the tempos you want.

Trust the orchestra not to drown out your calls. Musicians always play the best they know how. If things go wrong, better to lose tempo than temper.

From the opening view of the waiting audience - unexpectedly large, despite the damp, chilly weather - and of the Clan Sutherland bagpipe band parading on the green, to the closing moments of the program when the audience followed the pipers to roped-off Boylston St. for general dancing, the TV cameras caught the spirit of the program, "Folk Dancing Through the Year", presented by a N. E. Folk Festival Assn. committee headed by Arthur Tufts. Alan Smith did his usual adroit job as MC. Six folk dance groups from Boston - Scottish, Irish, English, Swedish, Armenian, and Lithuanian - and square and contra dancers from NEFFA membership presented dances done at special times of the year or on special occasions - courtships, May Day, weddings, harvest, etc. - in the different countries. Many, many congratulations are due Eddie Colin and his hard working committees for the outstanding way in which they presented the Seventh Annual National Square Dance Convention at Louisville, Kentucky, June 19 to 21, 1958.

All phases of the Convention were excellently planned and executed, despite the tremendous handicap of having only nine months to prepare. The workshops and clinics were ably managed, and the panel direction and participation were excellent. The tremendous Coliseum presented an inspiring sight to the many spectators who enjoyed the exhibitions and dance sessions. Although a good many of the visiting callers felt compelled to show their versatility by competing with each other with speed and intricate calls, the last hour of the program on the main floor will long be remembered as square dancing at its best. Program Chairmen Floyd and Magdalene Bohart deserve a hearty "well done" for a well laid out program.

The activity and interest shown at the Convention Bid Comnittee Meeting called by Chairman Howard Thornton was most encouraging. Excellent bids were submitted by Albuquerque, Dallas, Des Moines, and Miami Beach; and Des Moines was selected as the site of the 1960 Convention by a narrow margin. The unsuccessful bidders were urged by Chairman Thornton not to be discouraged, but to plan on rebidding at a future date. Interest in future conventions was also demonstrated by representatives from Detroit, Los Angeles, Omaha, Seattle, and Washington, D. C. Inquiries about future conventions should be addressed to Chairman Dixon at Five North Second Ave., Chula Vista, Cal. The members of the Executive Comm. present also voted unanimously to go on record as opposing over-organization of the square dance movement. They strongly feel that the present method of organization on a local level will best serve the future of our wonderful hobby.



A UNIQUE CONVENTION SWINGS INTO TOWN (As appeared in The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, June 18, 1958) For the next couple of days, the air of Louisville will be filled with the cheery notes of the fiddle, the sound of flying feet, and the ringing calls of "do si do". The square dancers are in town. Their national convention will be meeting here, with sone 10,000 men, women and children in attendance, and a more attractive and wholesome group has seldom visited us.

These are people of formidable energy. "Square dancers don't waste much time sleeping", notes their program director. They will take to the floor at the State Fairgrounds on both Friday and Saturday, beginning at 10 a.m. and going on until 11:30 at night. Members of the public with less skill and strength of breath can watch the experts skim around the floor at exhibition sessions on both afternoons and evenings. There will be "after-dance dances" at downtown hotels for those who still haven't had enough.

Square dancing is a hobby, a sport, almost a way of life. The square dance craze is totally unlike the fads for marathon dancing and flagpole sitting that have swept the country at odd moments in our history. This is the kind of recreation the early settlers of America enjoyed when they rested from their labors of clearing the wilderness, and it has every bit as nuch appeal for Americans of today. And it is a healthy pursuit. A square dance a day may even rank ahead of an apple as the best method of keeping the doctor away. Welcome to Louisville, dancers, and swing your partners all.

## Let's Learn a Folk Dance

ALFELDEK

Kecord: Methodist World of Fun M 115

German dance brought to us by Paul and Gretel Dunsing Formation: Lines of 3 facing 3 (2 men and 1 woman, 2 women and 1 man, or even 3 men or 3 ladies) in large circle. FIG. 1 After the short musical introduction, join hands in a

- counts

  circle of 6 and with a lilting step (walking step,
  rising on toe of foot after taking a step with that
  foot) circle L 8 steps, & 8 steps. Finish in the 2
  original straight lines.
- FIG. 2. The center person in each line of 3 hooks K elbows with the opposite center person and they walk once around each other with 4 slow steps. Each goes back to his own line of 3, turns his original K hand partner with L elbow (4 steps), his I hand partner with K elbow (4 steps), returns to his place between his 2 partners and joins hands three in line again
- (4 counts to do this in a very leisurely fashion).

  FIG. 3. Bending from the waist, all bow low to opposite line (4 counts). Each line of 3 walks diagonally forward to its & 4 steps. Then, having passed the line originally opposite them, the lines move diagonalty forward to the L 4 steps to their new places (the lines which originally were facing are now back to back), and each bows low for 4 counts to the new

line of 3 they are facing.
Repeat dance with new set of 3.

No matter how many extras of either sex are in your group, this dance will include them all. It is slow and relaxed, perfect for hot weather, or for a change of pace between faster dances, or for older dancers who dislike much physical exertion. It shows square dancers that folk dances are not all the fast, bopping affairs many seem to think. Although simple, this dance, like most slow ones, requires strict timing, especially in the low, exaggerated bows which make for so much of the fun of Alfelder. This careful attention to coordination of dance movements with the music is especially helpful to the many square dancers who tend to ignore music completely in their over-absorption with the figures of a dance. Doing these simple folk dances well, we've observed, almost always leads to smoother, more rhythmic square dancing, because it trains dancers to listen to the music as well as to the caller. Other slow dances for hot weather are Misirlou (described in the Dec. '57 Caller) and Spinnradl, (Feb. '58). We'll have another, Patch Tanz, for you next month. LOUISE WINSTON

CALICO GOWN
RECORD: Windsor 4468 (45 rpm, with calls)
4168 (45 rpm, instrumental)

FIGURE (and Break);

Walk all around your corner, turn a left hand round your pet

Go back and swing the corner, she's the one you can't forget

Circle round the land, you're walkin hand in hand Whirlaway, go right and left grand ....

And when you meet your lady, do-sa-do, well - I declare Turn the corner left, the ladies chain across the square Turn 'em there and then, you swing the corner Jane Quickly circle eight in a ring.....

Forward eight, come back, face the corner, box the gnat Pull her by to do-paso (partner left) Corner right so nice. Partner left, turn her twice Hold her tight like allemand thar....

Now everybody half-sashay to put the ladies in Your corners swat the flea, then promenade around the ring

Just walk along on down, with the sweetest girl in town In her little calico gown.

Walk all around corner, turn left band with partner, swing corner to gain temporary partner. Circle eight to left, partners whirlaway to start grand right and left with original partner. On meeting partner, do-sa-do, then turn left hand with corners to gain temporary partners. Ladies grand chain across set to current opposite, then swing current corners - original partners. Circle eight to left, go forward and back, box gnat with corner, pull corner by to start a dopaso with partner by turning ber with left hand turn corners with right hand, turn partners with left hand twice around ending in an allemand "thar" position. Without twirling or turning, partners merely exchange positions by sliding across in front of each other to place the ladies in an allemand "thar" position. Swat flea with current and original corner and promenade this person back to gents home positions.

Sequence: Dance entire Figure and Break for a total of four times.



3. In the past, quite a number of contras that have been presented have had the lineup as "any number of even couples." These double progression dances will have all couples active at the same time and in a short time everyone has danced with each other.

4. This also does away with the caller getting a number of six or eight couple sets on the floor, whereby they sometimes


gest intermingled and cause confusion.

This dance was called by myself at Sandy Island, N. H., with a large crowded floor of dancers who performed with absolute precision, a beautiful feat of contra dancing. The record used was "Wright's Quickstep", MH 1073-A, 12 inch. This is also available on a 10 inch disc. ## Editors Notelo

In spite of 20 years of revival, and a present National interest unprecedented in the annals of any country, square dancing is still enjoying growing pains. Like any program with such pains, suggestions are always forthcoming to help promote and organize.

After considerable travel and study, John Kobrock of Newtonville, Mass., in a report written last spring, asked for an expression of feeling concerning a National Organization to help steer and promote square dancing. The following article gives a resume of the answers received.

Regardless of ones personal feelings, regarding a National Organization, some thought should be given the subject. Mr. Kobrock has written a very thought-provoking survey which I recommend for your reading. C. B.

"KEEP OUR SQUARE DANCING ALIVE"

The readers of The New England Caller may be interested in a report released recently under the above title. Distribution was to a limited group of persons especially selected to give a representative cross section of the square dance movement. The notes in the report reviewed the present magnitude of square dancing activities, proposed consideration of certain aspects of those activities and suggested study of a possible national public relations and service organization. Although the report proposed membership on an individual basis in order to obtain as members those persons most interested, it would operate through and leave undisturbed the present clubs, federations and associations. Specificially the notes requested an expression of opinion. The normal percentage of replies to a question of this kind usually runs from 25 to 35%. In this case sufficient interest was aroused to prompt replies from 50% of the recipients.

To obtain these opinions, the U.S. was divided into seven geographical areas. In each area, one or two outstanding callers, round dance teachers, recreation leaders, square dance barn owner, dance leader at an educational institution, publisher or editor of a square dance magazine, dealer, etc. was mailed a copy of the report. The 15 categories covered by the mailing provided a cross-section of viewpoints without the expense of a large mailing. The opinions obtained by this form of sampling would differ very little from a more costly mailing many times larger. Most individuals fall into several categories; for instance, a person selected as a magazine editor may also be a square dance caller and a round dance teacher. In this way, a rather broad expression of viewpoints was obtained for any single segment (i.e. all callers or all dealers) of square dancing without the more extensive mailing. The mailing requested a "yes" or "no" vote on the proposed national organization. The reader will not be burdened with the data by categories. Suffice it to say that those most familiar with the accomplishments of organized effort in other fields - commerce, professions,

labor, etc. - generally voted yes. The majority in every category favored a centralized organization. For instance, if the replies are divided into two classes

a. those who draw income from square dancing, and b. those who foot the bill, i. e. dancers

we find A. income group - yes 65.7%, no 18.7% and straddle 15.6%. B. dancer group - yes 100% and no 0%. The answer seems clear cut. The folks under b. who pay the square dancing bill want a national service organization. Those who have a financial incentive in square dancing favor the service organization in the ratio of 7 (yes) to 2 (no) (i.e. ratio of 65.7% to 18.7%). Many replies expressed detailed reasons not only for their "yes" or "no" vote but also the few "straddle or no vote".

The great strength of the square dance movement lies in the individual clubs. It would be unfortunate if anything developed that would disturb this inherent strength. Yet a few clubs have already fallen by the wayside. The time is ripe for a centralized organization to help the clubs and federations maintain stability and improve their operations. Information is being obtained from various sections of the country about services now being rendered to clubs and their members. Future action on a national basis is dependent on these replies. 





AROUND BOSTON

The fifth annual weekend of the Scottish Country Dance Society of Boston was held at Long Pond, Plymouth, July 18-21, with some 127 in attendance (and we're sure not one more person could have crowded onto that dance floor). Campers came long distances - 25 from Canada, 36 from New York, 2 from Washington, D. C., 2 from Florida, and the rest from all over New England. The staff included Jeannie Carmichael, Marianne Taylor, and Alan Smith of the Boston group, Jean Tufts from N. H., and, new this year, two lively and likeable young Scots from Ontario - Jack Geddes of Toronto, and Bill Clark of Hamilton. This was in our opinion the best staff yet assembled for one of these weekends. The Scots insist that their teachers be thoroughly versed not only in the steps and dances, but also in the basic fundamentals of teaching. Patience, friendliness, humor, their own love of the dancing, and this complete command of teaching technique made it possible for this staff, the youngest of them only 24, to get the most difficult dances and finest points of style across to the group with incredible ease and speed and to make the learning as well as the dancing fun. I think that we in the square dance field can learn a lot from their methods, including their insistence on complete silence, at both their parties and classes, while the instructor is speaking - a thing taken completely for granted by the realistic Scottish dancers, who recognize the truism that they can't talk and listen at the same time. Would that square dancers felt the same - think of the teaching time we'd save for more dancing. A nationally famous caller scolded us on a visit here some years ago, saying that the Boston dancers were the rudest in this respect that he'd encountered anywhere in the country, and I fear we've not improved since.

This summer has shown a very noticeable upswing in attendance at most of the regular Boston dances. Until last year a sharp drop in attendance during the summer months was customary, with a return to normal after Labor Day. Last summer the Taylor's dance, until then a very small group, suddenly mushroomed and has filled its hall ever since. This year the same seems to be happening at the Boston YW, where each of the last four Tuesdays has seen a steady increase of about a set a week, and in Jamaica Plain, where the summer attendance has been larger than any since the Christmas party. Seems to auger well for the fall season.

Freedom of the press? Well, if what I have heard for quite some years is true, here is where I hope to exercise that

Are you a monthly meeting club member? Well, if you are, hang your head, or better still, just go hang. There are always those who gripe the loudest and complain the most and consistently fail to support club dances and activities, not to mention the guy who probably taught them how to dance. You no doubt sang his praises as you learned to dance, and felt a tinge of pride in acknowledging your association with the club, but the day came when you thought you knew more than the other club members or maybe the caller himself. Boy, are you living in a fool's paradise.

You are seen dancing elsewhere, and believe me, you really ought to return to the nest for advanced squares and rounds because your caller is way out in front when it comes to advanced dancing. This reporter will certainly vouch for that.

We don't say that you shouldn't patronize other dances, other callers. What we would like to get across to you is this -- if you profess to be a club member, have the decency to live up to just that. A club is only as good as its members and caller.

## Let's Learn a Folk Dance

Jewish Wedding Dance

Record: Folk Dancer MH 1092

Formation: Couples in a single circle with elbows bent and

joined hands held at shoulder level.

Step: A slow walking step throughout the dance, done as follows: Step forward on R foot (count "one"); bend the R knee (count 'and'); step forward on L foot (count 'two'); bend the L knee (count "and"). Hold body proudly erect, head high, and the whole gives a jaunty, strutting effect, as if to say, "See me all dressed up in my wedding-guest finery".

FIG. 1 Meas. 1-4 All holding hands and facing to R, circle to R (counter-clockwise) with 8 of these slow stepbends, starting on R foot.

Meas. 5-8 Circle L 8 steps, starting on R foot.

FIG. 2 Face center.

Meas. 9 Two step-bends toward center, starting with R foot.

Meas. 10 Clap own hands 3 times.

Meas, Il All join hands and take 2 step-bends backwards away from center (men starting with L foot, woman with R). As they reach their places, all drop hands and face partners.

Meas. 12 Stamp 3 times, with emphasis on heel. Stamp with inside foot - man's L, lady's R.

Meas. 13-16 Joining hands again, repeat meas. 9-12. FIG. 3 Meas. 17-20 Partners join both hands, the man keeping his partner on R, with arms outstretched at shoulder level. Circle 8 step-bends to L (clockwise) around each other,

Meas. 21-22 Reversing direction (lady now at partner's L) circle R with 4 step-bends.

Meas, 23-24 Man releases his R hand and raises his L, facing center of circle. Woman, still holding his L hand with her R, walks under these joined hands, turning slightly to her R, to face center of circle. (This will be about a quarter turn clockwise, just the simplest possible turn to face the center). She is now on man's L and has a new partner on her L. This takes 4 steps.

Repeat the whole dance with new partner.

Last month we promised you another slow dance for warm Sept. nights, and this simple little mixer, easily taught at a one-night stand, is just the thing. Expert dancers enjoy it as a change of pace and it is another dance useful in convincing people that folk dances are not all bouncy and strenuous. The little strutting step is all-important in giving the dance its style and its distinctive personality, as well as its spirit and fun. Encourage the dancers to smile and enjoy each other as though they really were at a wedding greeting seldom-met kinfolk and friends. This is one of a group of Jewish Patch, Potch, or Patz ("clap") dances from Eastern



WHO'S SORRY NOW By Howie Davison, Newcastle, Maine

Record: Windsor 7152, Instrumental Decca 27028 (Music by Frankie Froeba) Dos-a-dos your corner - - See-saw round your partner Allemande left your corner, and a grand old right and left Half way round the set - - When you meet you box the gnat The girls star left, the gents promenade, just half way

Ending for Decca Record: "Bow to your partner, bow to your corner, that's all". With the Decca record, there is no time for an introduction. This one works best if the dancers do not try to reach home position on the promenade, just start in when the next call hegins.

The Windsor record is the other side of "Basin Street Blues", and the Decca is the flip of "Weltz Delight", a

round dance poomlar in 1952.

"BEND THE LINE" Breaks:

One and three go out to the right, circle to the left just once around.

Head gents break and form two lines, forward eight and back with you;

\*Bend the line, pass through, bend the line, cross trail thru. Allemande left, etc.



These are very useful for teaching this movement. When two lines are back to back, use the same rule as for face to face: "Center People Back Out". (Only one-quarter turn --RALPH SWEET end people act as pivots).

A gentleman dropped in and told us he worked at the stable in 1906. The very finest carriages were stored in the section where we now square dance. Much of the floor needed leveling, glass needed replacing. Four sandings were necessary on the floor, walls and ceilings were painted, and a stage built. No activity provides the experience square dancing does. It was such a thrill, after weeks of work, to see the fruits of our labor.



- 5-8 TWIRL, 2; SLO TURN TWO-STEP; TWIRL, 2; As M walks fwd L,R, W twirls slowly once under M's L and her R both moving LOD and resuming original LOD; in closed pos. do two turning two-steps; M again walks fwd LOD l, R as W twirls on her R, L ending in closed pos. M facing LOD.
- 9-16 REPEAT MEAS. 1-8 ending in semi-closed position.
  17-20 FORWARD, 2/FACE; SIDE/CLOSE, CROSS; SIDE/CLOSE, CROSS; FAST SIDE/BEHIND, SIDE/FRONT; In semi-closed pos. walk fwd LOD, L, R facing partner on last ct.; step side LOD on L, close R, cross L in front (both M & W) to face RLOD; step side RLOD on R, close L to R; cross R over L twd LOD; assuming closed pos. quickly do fast grapevine LOD, ending in semi-closed pos.
- 21-24 REPEAT MEAS. 17-20 to end in semi-closed position.

Records: Folkraft 1209 or HMV 3892

Formation: Square set of 4 couples, numbered dounter-

clockwise. MUSIC

DANCE

Introduction (4 meas.) Address partners.

- Al Meas. 1-2 PART 1 Each man moves behind partner to next lady on R, who moves to meet him.

  (Walk-step-a rhythmical dance-walk with weight over ball of supporting foot).
  - 3-8 All set or balance to R and L and swing new partner. (Our regular American Buzz-step swing).
- A2 1-8 Men return to partners, balance and swing.
  B1 1-8 PART 2 Leading couple (1st couple this time
- B1 1-8 PART 2 Leading couple (1st couple this time) swings while the others clap in series of 3.
- B2 1-8 Leading couple promenade inside set to place, visiting each couple in turn (slight bow as they pass each).
- A3 1-4 PART 3 1st and 3rd couples change places, with couple 1 passing in between 3rd couple,
  - 5-8 then passing on the outside of 3rd couple as they return to place (turning as a couple each time, so that the lady is always on the R of her partner).
- A4 1-8 Same couples repeat Part 3.
- B3 1-8 PART 4 All join hands and circle to left once around. (polka step).
- B4 1-8 All promenade once around. (Polka or walkstep).

Repeat dance from beginning, with 2nd, 3rd, and 4th couples leading in turn.

In all promenades, the hand-hold is skaters' position, (i.e., hands crossed in front). LOUISE WINSTON

Girls go RIGHT, men go LEFT, make a right hand star in the middle of the ring. Go all the round to a left allemande, partner right, a right and left grand.

Directions for Dixie Chain: Two couples are heading toward each other single file. They move through each other hand over hand, similar to Grand Right and Left. The first two start with right hands, the second two start with left hands. Note that by having people go in the proper directions after it, a Dixie Chain can be substituted for a Pass Through, or Cross Trail. These numbers are ideal for teaching Dixie Chain.




### INTER-TOWN SQUARE DANCE CLUB







## The Dance of the Month.

I'M WALKIN' THE FLOOR OVER YOU By Hugh Williams, Vacaville, California

Record: SIO X2108 Instrumental

SIO X1105 Calls by Lee Helsel (both 45 rpm only)

INTRO - BREAK - ENDING

Side two ladies chain across the ring

All four ladies grand chain again

Head two couples right and left thru, turn 'em round and then Lead to the right, left allemande, grand right and left around. I'm Walkin' the floor over you

Dos-a-dos your girl and swing her too Promenade this girl and everybody sing,

I'm Walkin' the floor over you.

FIGURE:

Dos-a-dos your corner, go home, partner swing,

Join hands and circle round the ring

All four ladies chain across and turn the girl you found Whirlaway and weave the ring, go in and out around

Meet this brand new lady, turn her right elbow

Gents star left and round you go

Same little girl you promenade and everybody sing

I'm walkin' the floor over you.

SEQUENCE: Intro, Fig., Fig., Break, Fig., Fig., Ending.

This record, backed by a slightly more difficult number, "Farewell, So-Long, Good-bye" can safely be used without walk-thru at most club dances. It really appeals to the dancers as they can sing on the chorus.

### LINES DIVIDE

This new basic appears in quite a few new dances. Directions: From any even-numbered line, dancers turn and face nearest end of line. Here are a couple of breaks useful for teaching this movement:

1. Head couples out to the right, circle to the left just once

around.

Head gents break and form two lines, forward eight and back.

Lines divide, pass two, forward eight and back.

Forward again, cross trail thru, allemande left, etc.

2. Get four in line as above, then:

Lines divide and pass two, forward eight and back .

Pass through, lines divide, pass two, forward eight and back.

Pass through, lines divide, pass two.

Forward eight and back, cross trail through,

Allemande left, etc.

(After "Lines Divide", people on ends of the lines will have to turn slightly towards the other line. Pass right shoulders, and make new lines with the two people you just passed).

- PART 1 Waltz Balance L. 2, 3; R, 2,3; Roll (back to back), 1-4 2.3: Roll (Face to face), 2, 3; Step swd L on L, step on R in back of L, step L in place; step swd R on R, step on L in back of R, step R in place; starting on M's L. and progressing in LOD, both roll in LOD retaining trailing hands to back-to-back pos., then releasing trailing hands finish roll face-to-face, ending in butterfly pos. M's back to COH;

Repeat Part 1, Meas. 1-4; End in banjo pos., M 5-8

facing wall, W facing COH;

Walk Around, 2, 3; 4,5,6; Step Swing, 2,3; Maneuver, 9-12 2; From banjo pos. walk CW 3/4 'round, LRL, RLR, to end in semi-open pos. facing LOD; step on L. swing R fwd (hold); M steps fwd on R, maneuvering 1/4 turn R to face partner & RLOD, touch L by R in closed dance pos. (hold);

13-16 Waltz: Waltz: Waltz; Waltz; Backing up on M's L ft., 4 CW turning waltz steps to end facing LOD in but-

terfly pos. (No twirl).

RLR, W brings leading hand to skirt and opens out into open halfroom pos., both facing LOD; with arm around each other's waist (looking at each other) both spot-walk around (W backing up) I full CW turn in place, LRL, RLR;

Waltz Fwd, 2,3; Maneuver, 2,3; Waltz Turn; 2,3; 29-32 Twirl, 2,3; Waltz fwd in LOD in semi-open pos. leading hands now joined, LRL; M maneuvers 1/4 turn R to face partner and RLOD in closed dance pos: RLR one back-up CW turning waltz step, RLR W twirls under M's L and her R arm to butterfly nos.. M's back to COH.

Repeat sequence two more times. Play slightly faster than 78 RPM.

1-4 Waltz Balance L,2,3; R,2,3; Slow Roll,2,3; Bow Curtsy, 2,3; Same as Part 1, M 1 & 2; as music retards on M 31-32, both solo roll slowly in LOD; face partner, traditional bow and curtsy (hold). DICK DOYLE

## Let's Learn a Folk Dance

THREE MEET (Northern England)

Record: Folkraft F-1112

Formation: Lines of 3 facing 3 (man between 2 ladies, or lady between 2 men) in a large circle.

Step: Except in the last figure, the step is a lilting, rhythmic dance-walk with the weight on the balls of the feet.

Music Meas.

- Al 1-4 Fig. 1 "Threes" link arms, advance toward the opposte 3 with 3 steps, closing on fourth beat (RLR together), fall back to place the same way (LRL together).
  - 5-8 Each 3 moves as a unit counterclockwise (i.e., around to their R) to change places with the opposite 3, using 8 chassez (side-slip) steps or 8 walk-steps, as preferred.
- A2 1-8 Repeat above figure to places, with the lines completing the counterclockwise circle.
- B1 1-4 Fig. 2 Man (center person) arms twice round with R-hand partner. (Hook R elbows, turn in 8 walking steps).
  - 5-8 Man (center person) arms twice round with Lhand partner.
- B2 1-8 Fig. 3- "Threes" cuddle-up. (Make a basket, with joined hands linked behind one another's backs as in the American square dance figure). The "threes" swing round clockwise with the same buzz step used in our square dance swing (R foot in, pushing with L toe), each 3 progressing to its own R to pass by the opposite 3 and finish out in line facing the next 3.

Repeat the dance, facing a new "three".

This lively, active little dance is a wonderful way to include those extra men or women, to break the ice at a one-night stand, and to get a bit of the flavor of English country dancing without straying very far from figures familiar to American square dancers. We like the term "cuddle 'em up' much better than "make a basket", don't you? Who says our English cousins are stuffy and stand-offish.





To Whom It May Concern: The following is in answer to the letter, Dear Editor and Readers, Page 4, November '58 issue of The New England Caller.

Taking the questions in order: Would you like a Festival? If so, Why? My answer is yes. The why? will take some

telling.

A Festival, or Convention, properly handled could be a project that all the square dance clubs in the state could get behind, on an annual basis, thus drawing them together to work for a common cause. This in turn should encourage many clubs to join Edsarda, who do not belong at this time. Edsarda has been functioning for a year and I believe I am correctly informed that only about one-third of the square dance clubs in Massachusetts, eligible to belong, are members of Edsarda.

A Festival or Convention would act as a showcase of Massachusetts and/or New England calling and dancing. A place where clubs who are interested in getting callers for their club program could meet and hear the unknown.

A Festival or Convention of large proportion, on a statewide or New England basis is bound to get some good publicity from the metropolitan and small town newspapers, which we need.

Such an affair should be operated with a financial profit in mind so as to enable Edsarda to sponsor a Learn to Square Dance Week. See November New England Caller, page 10, "To Our Square Dance Friends".

The time of year should be determined so as not to conflict with the Atlantic Convention, regardless of where it is held.

No attempt should be made to sponsor a Festival or Convention until the fall of 1959 or spring of 1960. The suggested time lapse is to insure all concerned plenty of time to plan such an event. Also to enable clubs and callers to keep the date clear. On the other hand, the date should be set as soon as possible.

The suggested Festival or Convention would probably have to be held in some large city, which would have plenty of hotels, motels and dancing space. A city with two or three large hotels in close proximity to insure plenty of dancing (next page) and living space.

### ORCHESTRA COMBINATIONS

If you were to hire live music for a square dance, what instruments would you use?

A combination of two pieces would be, fiddle and piano. The fiddle to carry the melody, and the piano to give you.

rhythm and a beat.

A three piece combination would be fiddle, piano and banjoguitar (someone that plays both), the addition of the banjoguitar affords more contrast, depth and counter melody, making it a more satisfying combination.

For a four piece combination, I would add a bass fiddle. With this instrument carrying a steady beat, the banjo-guitar, and piano would be free to alternate in carrying the melody, or variations. This combination of instruments would satisfy the needs of the average public dance.

If it was to be a big festival, or special occasion, I would like to see someone try the following instruments: fiddle. piano, banjo-guitar, bass, clarinet, accordian and drummer. An additional fiddle would be desirable to play counter mel-

ody or harmonize with the first fiddle.

The fiddles for the melody, the piano for rhythm, and counter melody, also; an occasional melody, the banjo-guitar for variety and tone contrast, the bass fiddle for its steady beat, the clarinet for its soft mellow tone, capable of playing melody and counter melody. The accordian for its rhythm, melody, counter melody, beat and singing quality. The drum for its steady beat and rhythm. Add to this a capable leader who can keep the orchestra as a background for the caller, and yet be pleasing to the dancers, and you would have an ideal festival orchestra. AL RUGGERO



Edsarda is working on better public relations, but as it is still in its infancy it is progressing gradually.

How about the general Public's knowledge of great amount of square dancing in our (or any) area? I recently took four couples to a beginners party. What was their reaction?

1. "Gee, what fun." 2. "We never dreamed so many people square danced". I, of course, told them of some of the other dances going on that same night, and they were amazed. Will they become square dance enthusiasts? Who can tell. They were impressed, but were they sold? The New England Caller and Sets in Order are dancers magazines, and not the type of printed material these people need. What is there available to arouse their interest? What's the answer?

Ed. note: Regional and National magazines help. Editorials in metropolitan papers help. There just are too few of them. A "Publicity Fund", contributed by dancers, callers and leaders could buy radio, TV, billboard and advertising space. If all interested parties put their shoulder to the wheel on this kind of a project, I am sure much could be accomplished in interesting the general public.

Position: Escort position, facing LOD (CCW around circle) with inside arms inter-locked.

Footwork: Identical throughout-both start on left.

Introduction-Four Measures-Wait

#### SEQUENCE A

#### Measure

- 1- 2 WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; (Step forward on left, step forward on right, step forward on left, brush forward with right. Step forward on right, step forward on left, step forward on right, brush with left;)
- 3- 4 STEP, CLOSE, BACK, -; BACK, CLOSE, FOR-WARD, --; (Step forward on left, close right to left, step backward on right, step backward on right, close left to right, step forward on right.)
- 5- 6 WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; (Repeat Measures 1 & 2)
- 7-8 STEP, CLOSE, BACK, --; BACK, CLOSE, FOR-WARD, --; (Repeat Measures 3 & 4)
- 9-10 STEP, BEHIND, STEP, —; STEP, BEHIND, STEP, —; (This is the currently popular "stroll" step—Step forward on left, step on right behind and to the left of left foot, step forward on left; step forward on right foot, step on left foot behind and to the right of right foot, step forward on right foot; This movement progresses forward in LOD)
- 11-12 WALK, —, WALK, —; WALK, —, WALK, —; (Slow Walk:—Step forward on left, Step forward on right; Step forward on left, Step forward on right;)
- 13-14 STEP, BEHIND, STEP, —; STEP, BEHIND, STEP, —; (Repeat measures 9 & 10)
- 15-16 TURN, —, TWO, —; THREE, —, FOUR, —; (Both turn left individually in four slow walking steps starting with left foot and ending facing LOD and assume Varsouviana position.

#### SEQUENCE B

1- 2 WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH/TURN; VARSOUVIENNE POSITION, Facing LOD (C CW around circle) (Step forward on left, step forward on right, step forward on left, brush forward with right; Step forward on right, Step forward on left, Step forward on right brush left foot at same time both make ¼ right face turn to face wall retaining Varsouviana position.)

- 3-4 SIDE, CLOSE, CROSS —; SIDE, CLOSE, CROSS, TURN;
  (Couples remain facing wall during this movement —Both step to left on left (LOD), Close right to left, step on left in front of and across right (RLOD); Both step to right on Right (RLOD); CLOSE Left to Right, step on right in front of and across left (LOD), both make ¼ left face turn to again face LOD retaining Varsouvlana Position.)
- 5-6 WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH; WALK, TWO, THREE, BRUSH/TURN; (Repeat measures 1 & 2)
- 7- 8 SIDE, CLOSE, CROSS, —; SIDE, CLOSE, CROSS, TURN; (Repeat measures 3 & 4)
- 9-10 STAR/LEFT, TWO-STEP, BRUSH; AROUND, TWO-STEP, BRUSH/TURN; (Partners drop the joined right hands but retain joined left hands and then both starting with left foot, man does one two-step and brush in place, while the lady does one two-step and brush around and away from partner; then both starting with right foot partners execute another two-step and brush around in this left hand star position ending with both executing a ½ left face turn as they drop joined left hands and then join right hands;)
- 11-12 STAR/RIGHT, TWO-STEP, BRUSH; AROUND, TWO-STEP, BRUSH; (Now in right hand star position both starting with left foot, execute two two-step brush sequences around each other ending with man to COH facing LOD and lady toward wall facing RLOD)
- 13-14 SIDE, CROSS, SIDE, SWING; BACK, CROSS, SIDE, TOUCH/FACE; (Both starting with left foot partners grapevine away from each other—man toward COH and lady toward wall—step left on left, cross right behind left, step left on left, and swing right foot across and in front of left; both starting on right foot partners grapevine back toward each other—man toward wall, lady toward COH—step to right on right, cross left behind right, step right on right, touch left foot to right foot and turn to face partner.)

HASHING UP THE "PASS THROUGH" Record; Old Timer 8131, Fiddler's Dream - Beaver Creek. or any Hoedown.

First and third, forward and back Pass through, just the gents turn back. Follow that girl to the right, around one, Into the middle, two ladies chain. Turn them around and pass through, Gents turn back and follow that girl Right around one, into the middle, Two ladies chain and turn 'em around Cross Trail through, find your corner, Allemande Left, etc.

This one is simple enough for any group, with proper walkthrough, and is a lot of fun. It is also good preparation for n.ore complicated versions, as "Pass through, gents turn back to a Dixie Chain".


#### SPRINGFIELD SQUARE DANCE CLUB

by Chet and Barbara Smith, Bay Path Barn Record: Decca 9-30363 "White Silver Sands" (45 rpm) Position: Open, facing LOD inside hands joined. Footwork: Opp. M starts L.

Pattern

#### Meas.

1-2 TWO STEP, TWO STEP; WALK, 2, 3, 4; In open pos. take 2 two-steps fwd LOD; raising joined hands change sides with 4 walking steps. (W walks under arch as M walks around). End facing RLOD with W on inside of circle.

TWO STEP, TWO STEP: WALK, 2, 3, 4: 3-4 Repeat meas. 1-2 in RLOD. End with partners facing both hands joined, W on outside again.

TWO STEP BAL, TWO STEP BAL; WALK, 2,3,4; Do one two-step balance swd in LOD, repeat swd halance in RLOD (may do Pas De Basque); with 4 walking steps the M turns L face twd COH in a half circle moving to the next W in RLOD, while the W progressing LOD one full turn (R face) walks 4 steps to meet a new partner; end facing both hands joined.

7-8 TWO STEP BAL, TWO STEP BAL, WALK, 2, 3, 4; Repeat Meas. 5-6. End facing LOD in open pos. inside hands joined to repeat dance from beginning,

# Let's Learn a Folk Dance

THE ROBERTS

Record: Beltona 2457 - Rick-Ma-Ree Scottish Old Tyme Dance

Formation: Social dance (ballroom) position. Usually done in a large circle, partners facing. Man's back is to center of circle.

The step is described for the man; lady dances the same

pattern, starting with opposite fout.

PART 1 (Sometimes in Scotland and often in eastern U. S. the social dance position is changed in this part to a two-hand hold, facing partner. Our personal preference is for the social position throughout, but suit yourselves).

Meas.

l Step sideward L, close R foot to L; repeat.

With 4 walking steps, turn outward away from partner, making a little circle. (Counter-clockwise turn for man, clockwise for woman). Finish facing partner with feet in closed position. Both should progress forward around the big circle during this turn.

3-4 Repeat all of Part 1.

5 PART 2. In open dance position (partners side by side, man's R arm around lady's waist, her L hand on his shoulder, both facing CCW around circle with their other hands joined), do a heel and toe starting on the outside foot (man's L, lady's R).

Take 1 two-step forward, starting with outside foot.

Repeat above, starting with inside foot: heel, toe, two-

step.

7-8 Closed ballroom position. Turn once around (CW) with 4 two-steps, progressing forward around the circle.

Repeat the whole dance as often as desired.

The dance is frequently made progressive in one of several ways. The one we like best is this: In part one of the dance, during the first turn outward away from partner, the man rolls back to face the girl behind him in the circle and keeps her for a new partner. In any progressive version of the dance, the formation must be a large circle. If the dance is not done with a partner change, it need not stay in a circle but merely moves in a general CCW direction like any ball-room dance.

This is one of the so-called Old Tyme, or old ballroom, dances from Great Britain. It is generally credited to Scotland but is also done in England. It is a simple dance popular among U. S. square dancers, even where few other foreign folk dances are done, and is an excellent vehicle for teaching a two-step turn to a beginner group.



In other words, the two lines pass thru each other, right shoulder by right shoulder with your opposite, then ladies cross trail to the left in front of the gents. Meanwhile gents veer to the right to meet a new lady for the allemande left.
