# Some Editor's Notebook


#### MODERATION IS GOOD

FOR SOLINE DANCERS

### IN THE PATTERN BOOKS

At least once a year, I make a complete search through the standard commercial pattern books of McCall's, Simplicity and Butterick just to see what I can glean from them in ideas for variations in my square dance dresses to keep my sewing interesting and to pass on to you patterns that are useful if the square dance patterns are not easily available to you. Almost any good fabric store will have one or all of these three companies represented. If you have only a limited time to shop, take this article with you and use it as a guide for your pattern needs for square dance sewing.

Here is a hint or two on bodices and blouses that are too blousey — Cut the pattern exactly as indicated. Stay stitch around the neck. Put the blouse together except for sleeves and neck finish. Machine baste all seams and darts. Put the blouse on wrong-side out. Pin front closing, if there is one. If it is a blouse to he worn with a separate skirt, pin all seams to conform loosely to your figure, adding darts under the bust and from waist to shoulder blades in the back if there are none, but do not snug in the blouse from the waist to the hips — it is less likely to pull out when shaped this way. If you are making the blouse into a bodice for a dress, do the same as above but fit it more snugly over the ribs and at the waist. Now restitch your seams and darts, remembering to allow for a placket opening on the bodice, and also on the blouse if needed. Try on the bodice or blouse once more to be sure you are satisfied. At this time, for the bodice, tie an elastic around your waist and pull the bodice down into place and mark your waistline with pins or chalk or some basting thread. Now finish off sieeves and neckline. Do not cut off the spare fabric below the waistline until you have made your skirt and reassured yourself as to where your waistline should be — See NEEDLE NOTES Volume I, page 8 for procedure.

Now for some of the more useful patterns that I saw . . .

#### McCALLS

There were a number of good blouses with the country look which is so appropriate for square dancing.

#8006 is a nice peasant blouse with a set in sleeve, which comes in sizes 6 to 16 and costs \$2.75. You can make the full sleeve any length you want or for summer, sleeveless or a little cap sleeve. Page 365.

#7927, sizes 8 to

16, page 365. A raglan sleeve, buttoning up the front with a round yoke, with or without the ruffle. Long or elbow length sleeves.

2006

#7793, \$2.75, page 366. This would make into a good dress top with it's shoulder ruffles. Consider it with the skirt of #7688. A great country look.

Other blouses worth looking at are # 7544, sizes 8-24 with short or long sleeves, and # 6938, sizes 6-16 which has a nice variation of yokes.

In the skirt section there is the three-tiered, flounced skirt, #8336 for \$3.25 in sizes 6-16 but beware of skirts C and D as they are not suitable for square dancing due to the tightness around

the hips. There are other skirts worth looking at for ideas but they are really not full enough for our dancing, so make notes on trimming ideas, but don't buy the patterns for dancing. #8243 includes a nice little vest but will cost you \$3.50. See page 557.

#7668 is a fine S/D dress with a single or double flounced skirt, two lengths of puff sleeves, scoop neck and a very good bodice seam line. The skirt is a circle so don't get a droopy or loose-weave fabric as it will hang unevenly after a few wearings. This is a good pattern and a good buy at

\$2.75. It comes in sizes 8 to 16 and petites, 5 to 9.

While in McCalls, look on pages 782-83 at the prairie costumes which are designed in nice styles for the square dance look. #8169 and #878 have got good features but the skirts must be shorter and fuller. With a little inventiveness

you could come up with some great dress designs — consider using the bodices with our six-yard gathered skirt as shown in NEEDLE NOTES, Vol. 1 on page 30.

### SIMPLICITY

Simplicity has always had good, easy to make patterns. In the last few years the company has added the name Gunne Sax to its list. Gunne Sax is a trade name for a brand of dresses sold in department stores. The dresses are beautifully designed country-style clothes that are figure flattering and have a great square dance flavor; the bodices are perfect, but the skirts are too long and slender, but can be shortened and doubled in fullness. Be sure to take time to look at these. These can be found on pages 282-288, mostly sizes 6-14, priced \$3.50 and \$4.00.

Worth special mention in Gunne Sax are the following:

#5191 which also features a nice little quilted vest.

#5491 which includes a short jacket.



#5828 - an exceptionally handsome bodice with slimming lines and striking Gibson girl sleeves. (See sketch.)

#5879 — (In the Wedding dress section, pages 396-7) Features a beautiful neckline and bodice shaping and large elbow length puff sleeves. Available in sizes 8 to 16. (See sketch.)

#\$376 - Gives us the classic peasant blouse in sizes 6 to 20 for \$2.50. This is shown as long-sleeved but you can, of course, shorten it to any length you want. (See sketch.)

In the blouse section you will see many full-sleeved, ruffled blouses all suitable for square dancing, as well as for streetwear — a good selection of choices.


#5383 also has a good peasant blouse with a gathered, tied neckline and also a flounced skirt, as well as an embroidery transfer for the blouse — a good buy for \$3.00. Comes in sizes 6 to 16.

#5846 shows a great dress bodice with a ruffled bib front, full long sleeves (or short), collar or stand up neck ruffle. Sizes 6-16. \$3.50 (See sketch.)

#5872 is a totally different kind of bodice. The large puff sleeve is also the support for the simple bodice, Ideal for a pretty summer dress or a special event dress. This pattern offers a variety of sleeves; long, short, % or shoulder ruffle. Sizes 6-16. Just \$3.00. (See sketch.)



#5724 in the Wedding Dress section is worth looking at because of the beautiful treatment of the neckline and sleeves. This pattern comes in sizes 6-20 and costs \$4.00. (See sketch.)

#5811 is a dress in the Larger Sizes section. It comes in sizes 40-46



and has a very soft ruffled neckline in a V and cape sleeves, ideal for dancing. The skirt could be made double fullness to take a S/D petticoat. There are many ways this pattern could be varied by different fabrics - solids and prints to help the larger lady have a variety of dresses from one pattern,

#9886 - A man's western shirt in neck sizes 15-17, chest sizes 38-46. Also includes an embroidery transfer, \$2.50.

### BUTTERICK



Right on the cover, we have something for the lady who wants to make a bodice that is different. (See sketch.) It is the bodice of a dress, but would need a different skirt for square dancing. It will take an experienced seamstress to work this one. This is #4792 for \$3.00. A simpler and easier version is #4798.

Most of the Butterick blouse patterns are too blousey for many of us but the Wedding Gown section has some good bodices. Two in particular are worth noticing:

#4765 features either a voke or big scoop neckline with a single or double ruffle. It comes in

sizes 6-18 and costs \$3.50. (See sketch.)

#4766 has beautiful styling in its large puff sleeves with wide ribbon shoulder bows in the style of a 19th century ball gown. This also comes in sizes 6-18 and costs \$3.50.





#4544 is a simplified version of #4766 and can be found in the "Fast and Easy" section. It is shown with a dropped waist which is not difficult to change. Sizes 6-16. Cost: \$2.75.

\*3361 will be found on page 3512. This is a simple cape with a hood. It comes in three lengths lined or unlined. It can be made for rain or cold weather and is a wonderful way to protect your S/D dress in bad weather.

#4176 is a lady's western shirt, including embroidery transfer, in sizes 8-16. #4181 is the man's matching shirt in sizes 14-17%, also with embroidery transfer. Each pattern costs \$2.75.

#4212 is a square circle skirt, believe it or not, with a flounce on the bottom that gives a little different look to the whole thing. Could be worked with contrasting colors or print and solid. Waist sizes 23-30. \$2.75 See sketch.

These patterns are just a few highlights from the pattern books. You may find some that you like better. I have one bit of advice to offer in any case. Please buy the pattern you really like, now. So often they are gone when you decide you want one of them later. It is sometimes worthwhile to work together with other club members, sharing and exchanging patterns, each buying a different pattern (if you use the same size) then trading or tracing. I would like to also suggest that you carry tracing paper with you when you look through the books and trace off any ideas you really like, for it is hard to remember later, when it comes to actually trying to copy something you saw.

### Round Dance Leader's School

KINGSTON, ONTARIO

In order to ensure an adequate supply of round dance teachers to meet the future needs of the movement in the various regions across Canada and elsewhere, a decision has been made to operate a R/D leader's school over each Canadian Thanksgiving weekend as part of the Canadiana R/D Institute which is now entering its tenth year of operation at the 401 Inn, Kingston, Ontario.

This year's school will be held on Oct. 7, 8, 9, 1983 and will be for:

- (a) Graduate round dancers who wish to become qualified R/D leaders in club operations.
- (b) S/D callers who wish to receive training related to the teaching of "square dance" level rounds in square dance clubs.
- (c) Graduate round dancers who wish to become "Para-Leaders" and teach round dancing to (i) senior citizen groups, (ii) the disabled, and/or (iii) other groups within a community.
- (d) School teachers, recreation leaders, and others who, with having some knowledge of dancing beforehand, will be trained to teach round dancing in the schools, institutions, etc.

For those wishing to become fully qualifed teachers, the course will cover a Level I, Level II, and a Level III. As a couple or individual complete a weekend at Kingston, it is proposed that they put in a further 30 weeks of training in their home area, hopefully under the tutorship of an established R/D leader, and then return to Kingston in the following year for the next Level. Upon completion of the three-year course, a certificate will be issued as accredited teachers of round dancing. For those who only wish or need a "short" course as possibly in the case of a S/D caller, the requirements may be altered.

The staff for the school needs little or no introduction. Charlie & Bettye Procter, Dallas, Texas were on staff at last year's Montreal convention, and have been dancing and teaching for many years. They are also well-known choreographers (MY LOVE, GREEN DOOR, and many others.) Bill & Irene Morrison, Brooklin, Ont. have been on staff at Canadiana since the Institute began and are well-known Canadiana choreographers who have won international recognition for their BEAUTIFUL RIVER, ARMS OF LOVE to name but a few. Art & Garrie Jackson, past-presidents of the Canadian Square & Round Dance Society and former Editors-in-Chief of Canadian Dancers News will be the third couple on staff and will also continue to serve as registrars for the Institute.

The manual or textbook for the course is now in the final stages of preparation. It is by the internationally-known R/D leader team of Eddie & Audrey Palmquist who will be in Kingston and Ottawa this coming June to conduct clinics for R/D enthusiasts. Registration forms giving details as to course content, costs, accommodation, possible financial assistance, etc. will be available shortly. Anyone wishing a registration form or additional information should contact Art & Garrie Jackson, 578 Pleasant Park Rd., Ottawa, Ont. K1H 5N1 (Tel: 613-731-4825).

It is planned to operate this school in close cooperation with the National Professional Development program of the Canadian Square & Round Dance Society as well as with the Ontario Square & Round Dance Federation.

### The Crisis of Levels

PART TWO

Since the last article on this subject was published, this writer has been pleasantly surprised with the comments received from both dancer and caller alike. The dancer's comments usually were along the lines that, "I was either rushing to get someplace, or I was waiting when I got there." " I felt at some dances that I attended that my legs were awfully tired halfway through the dance, and yet at other dances I never tired at all." In thinking back now, I remember that at the dances that I tired quickly, it didn't seem as though I had any help from the music to move . . . From callers in general, the comments were usually along the lines that it was about time someone had the guts to tell it like it really is for everyone to see . . . maybe the dancers will help out more if they understand the situation better. Another caller said quite emphatically, "Every time I asked in caller's school, 'How many beats of music does that take?' the answer was usually, 'Watch your dancers, don't rush them, but don't make them wait!' "Needless to say, he was very frustrated in that area of calling.

This writer has found that by and large, most callers are people very dedicated to what they are doing and are honestly doing the best job that they can with what they have to work with. It seems to me that our greatest need is the proper training to offer them when they first start out. Unfortunately, this has not been the case in the past, as it is much easier to those running caller's schools to boggle their minds with all sorts of approaches to moving people from one place to another without requiring the timing along with it. Consequently, we have a situation today whereby many callers survive on sight calling along with combinations of other systems, none of which demand any execution to the music, or for that matter to the dance structure itself.

In direct relation to this, if they were to apply this same principle to round or contra dancing, they would be out of business in less than a week. No one has ever emphasized to them that it is possible to dance the squares. It is possible to have lines move forward & back in unison; it is also possible to have the whole floor moving in the same steps at the same time no matter what they are dancing. Of course, this is not possible without proper training in specifically that area of calling. The real KEY to it all is the proper use of the MUSIC. It is the only common denominator for both caller and dancer. How the caller uses the music will be reflected directly on how the dancer uses the music also . . . We need only to use common sense to realize that this is not the easy way to learn to call . . . This way demands that the caller keep track of the beats of music, what he is calling, and if the dancers are executing it in the proper manner, all at the same time!

As you can imagine, it is not easy, as the above must be combined with helping those dancers who are having trouble remembering the basics that they have just learned a short time ago. I am convinced that even though it is the tough way to call, it is the right way and that the real winners will be the dancers and the whole movement in general. People will once again be able to take pride in not only what they have learned, but in the realization that they are doing it right. They will start to experience more satisfaction in the feeling that they have truly learned skills attached to dancing, rather than just the frills of having just gone through something for the "sake" of variety. When the movement concentrates more on skills, it will find that we don't need as many frills . . .



# What Is A Good Dancer?

The current issue of "Skling" magazine includes an article titled, "The Closel Scorekeeper." The basic message of the article is that for most participants, skling is a non-competitive sport, yet many skiers spend a fair amount of time on the mountain comparing themselves with others—secretly keeping score. As I read the article I was struck by the similarity with square dancing which also presents itself as largely non-competitive. We don't compare the sharpness of turns or the accuracy of pole positions but we do take note of the people who aren't quite as likely to make it through the tip without a breakdown. The squares with the weaker dancers are often the last to fill and if we have the choice, we'd rather dance with folks who dance better than we do.

The parallels are by no means complete. Skiing has a competitive arena where excellence is measured by speed and another where form and style is the yardstick. In square dancing, we've never established a way to keep score — or at least never one that most people could accept and perhaps that's a problem. Many people today assume that the person who can execute more calls a "better" dancer. By this standard the people who dance Advanced and Challenge levels must be better dancers than those who dance only Mainstream level. I don't agree! I am happy to grant that learning to execute all the Advanced calls without a false move is a very significant accomplishment. What I am unwilling to accept is that this accomplishment makes someone a better DANCER.

In our classes these days, we (caller-teachers) are so rushed to get through the list of calls that we cannot spend the time to teach style, courtesy and accuracy. We hope that there will be time during next year's club workshops to add these niceties and to give our first year dancers time to practice the calls we have taught so they may work off the rough edges and learn to do them with the smoothness that can only come from repetition. In practice, they are pushed on to a new level, either to keep up with their friends or their club and many of them never become smooth dancers at all. Many who are dancing at the Advanced level are not even very good at executing the Mainstream calls because they have had very little practice doing them during their rush to reach the Advanced plateau. CALLERLAB recommends a year of dancing at each level before trying the next. The reason for the recommendation is to allow acquiring a thorough knowledge of the calls and to give time to develop dancing style. Divers and gymnasts develop a quality performance by doing the same moves over and over. Square dancers who shortcut this step risk being rough and sloppy in their execution of the calls.

The article in "Skiing" concludes by urging people to analyze good skiing technique rather than criticizing poorer skiers. The same is good advice for those who wish to be "better" dancers. When you dance with good dancers — people who move smoothly and accurately through whatever calls they know — notice what makes them good and try to copy it. Don't copy the gimmicks and roughness of the show-off. Look instead at the ease with which the dancer with 10 years experience is always in the right place, facing the right direction. They don't pull or shove. They help their square by always being where they should be at the right time. The good dancer always hears the call correctly, swings and turns with a firm hand pressure, steps in time with the music and has time enough to smile at the others in the square. Analyze them and try to copy their skill at whatever level you choose. The Convention is a good place to practice. See you in Burlington.



### HIGHLIGHTS OF CLUB HISTORY 1963-1983

### Silver Squares 25th Anniversary

WALLINGFORD, CONNECTICUT

The Silver Squares will celebrate their Silver Anniversary with a ticket dance to be held at the Town Office Building, 701 Center St., Wallingford, on April 30. Ed Novak will be the caller with Jack Leineke on the rounds. A special tribute will be made to club caller Bob Merunka and his wife Lucille who started the club twenty-five years ago.

The club began as the Meriden Silver Squares with the start of their first lessons in mid-jan, of 1958. The first week there were three couples, plus two couples who had graduated in other areas who helped as angels. The second week three more couples attended and Bob Merunka started teaching in earnest. After ten lessons, the first graduation was held and another class started. At the end of the first year there were four squares and Bob Merunka turned the club over to the members. Ray & Marianne Dunlop are the 1983 presidents, and we are proud to claim the honor of having the same caller and teacher for twenty-five years — our own Bob Merunka and Lucille.

### Chip's TIP



A four-couple set dance I recently put together is my dance offering for this month. I use it at one-night stands all the time. It appears to be simple, and basically is, but has a problem built in for new dancers. The problem also makes them pay attention to what's going on. (I'm tempted to add ... "in order to survive." but that's not really what dancing is all about. I hope.)

Put four couples into a longways proper and tell them they're numbered from the top down as Cus. 1, 2, 3, and 4. (You might add this to a set of squares by having Cu. I wheel around and the others fall in behind and all face partners.)

Then announce that Gentleman 1 and Lady 2 and Gentleman 3 and Lady 4 are First Corners. Have them walk through the A1 part. Then tell the remaining dancers, Lady 1 and Gentleman 2 and Lady 3 and Gentleman 4, that they are the Second Corners. Walk them through the A2 part. (Which, of course, is the same as the A1 part.)

The rest of the dance is selfexplanatory so I'll give it here and then we can talk about the small, built-in problem for new folks on the floor.

### BROOKS AND FIELDS

Formation: Longways, 4 couples proper. Music: Any 32-har reel. (Or see text.)

- Al ist Corners Fwd & Back [4 bars]; The same two turn with 2 hands [4 bars].
- A2 2d Corners do the same.
- BI Cus I & 2 and Cus J & 4 Right & Left hand Star.
- B2 All DoSiDo with Partner [4 bars]; Top Cu. (No. 1) lead down the center to the foot, the others moving up [4 bars].

..........

At this point the round is completed and everyone is renumbered for the next round. This is the problem spot I mentioned earlier. And it should be pointed out beforehand. The original First Corners, or some of them, may attempt to start the next round. Some of the new First Corners won't start, or will hesitate if the old First Corners "false start," (If that sounds confusing, pity the new dancer!)

Experienced dancers (And some leaders) don't realize how these simple changes can "throw" new dancers. A couple of times through and they begin to get the idea and the dance starts to flow.

The tune I use for this dance is Indian Queen as the dance is my adaptation of the 1701 Playford dance. This melody is one of my favorites and has been very well recorded on an English Ip entitled The English Dancing Master. The album number is EFDSSPLA4, and that's important as there are four records with the same title.

There are many other useable tunes on this recording. Useable for dances other than the original 17th and 18th century creations. (I hear the cries of *Heresy!*, but they're simply not well founded in historical fact.)

These imported records are quite expensive, and if you're not into Playford music you can substitute any 32-bar tune of your choice. Well . . . not any, as not all tunes and dances work well together. But that's another story, and most likely another column.

For those of you not familiar with the original Indian Queen dance pattern you simply do a Set and Turn Single for the Forward and Backs and a Hey, no hands, for three changes in place of the Top Cu. leading to the foot. (For club dancers that's like doing a three-quarter Square Thru without taking hands.) The original dance is done as a country dance duple proper with the progression occurring by way of the final Hey figure.

A closing note: Four times through gives every couple a chance to lead down but I usually go a few more times and/or let the record run its course. And, . . , with many groups there's no reason why you can't do the Set and Turn Single figures for the first half of the A music if your intuition says it'll go over.

### LET'S DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT ...

Subject: GIVE THEM A BREAK.

If we are attending a MS dance there is always someone requesting an A1 tip. If we attend an A1 dance, an A3 tip is requested and I suppose at a C1 dance there is someone who wants a C3 tip. It averages about 2 squares out of 20 who want something extra. If we attend a round dance evening, there are always 1 or 2 couples who want a round dance that no one else has learned.

What concerns me most is the angels taking valuable time from the class to do their own tip. Beyond that there are those attending a class level dance who want a special tip for the experienced dancers. I happened to have this request one night white calling a class level dance, and so I agreed to call a tip for them white the others go downstairs for refreshments. I wonder why there were not interested in this arrangement? Another night, I had a request from the President to speed it

up and add more challenge. I always oblige by asking for a show of hands and in this case the beginners preferred overwhelmingly to maintain the present level. In general, class level dances are well-attended and the experienced dancer does not go to help out but rather to enjoy an evening of relaxed dancing. It has always been my opinion that even round dancing should be curtailed and that time given to doing mixers or to teach an easy round dance. The round dancers can utilize the refreshment break for a few rounds of their own.

The time has come when we should pay more attention to the new learners and graduates. They are the life blood of future square dancing. They should be catered to until they have gained confidence. This is something worth thinking about.

Eastern District Square And Round Dance Association NEWSLETTER

Has your club ever been sued? It has become increasingly obvious to many square dancers who are in executive positions in our activity that any square dance club or association must have insurance to cover liability for injury or damage at our many dances and functions. Often clubs using public buildings are required to provide evidence that such insurance in in force before they are allowed to use the premises.

Knowledgeable members of EDSARDA have researched the problem and are of the opinion that each club should purchase a Comprehensive General Liability Policy with a limit of, at least \$300,000 per occurrence for Bodily Injury or Property Damage. This policy would pay whatever the insured is legally liable for because of damages for bodily injury or property

damage arising out of the activities of the insured. The policy should include coverage for injury caused by foodstuffs and beverages served as refreshments. Consideration should be given to broadening the coverage by the addition of a Broad Form Endorsement which would include, among other things, Fire Damage Legal Liability coverage.

This form of policy would respond to claims made by individuals who are members of the club or association if they are claiming bodily injury or property damage. This insurance is available either on an individual basis for each club or through the use of a group policy through an association. It is possible to get a substantial savings in premium through the group policy.

Thought also should be given to the purchase of a separate policy to provide Hire Car and Non-Owned Automobile Liability insurance to protect the club from liability arising out of the use by a member of his automobile for club activities.

Square Dancing is a fairly strenuous activity and one which can sometimes lead to unfortunate occurrences causing injury. Insurance is the best way to protect ourselves from the consequences of our risks.

Ed. Note: The following is an editorial as it appeared in The SQUARECASTER, February 1983.

### Why doesn't anyone help?

The major complaint of square dance club (actually, any club) officers is, "Why doesn't anyone volunteer? They don't have any club spirit. They just want the fun without the work."

Is this really the case? Isn't it possible that some people are merely unsure of themselves; uncertain of their welcome? If this is so, there are many remedies, none of which are difficult.

- Try not to have small gatherings of "selected" club members, include everyone with a personal touch. A five-minute chat with a newcomer at an afterparty just may help them feel more comfortable around you and other officers.
- 2. You say you schedule hoard meetings and only the same old people come? Have you tried personally inviting people? "Are you coming to the board meeting Sunday? It's at my house and we usually play cards afterwards. We'd love your input and ideas." Those words take a lot less time then putting up the decorations for the next dance yourself because no one volunteered.
- Never turn people down. Even if you don't need their help with decorations, which they preferred, maybe this dance they could

sit on the door. Once snubbed, twice shy, as they say, and I speak from experience. I volunteered to a major committee to act in my field of expertise (public relations, promotion) and was accepted, only to be told later that, due to an oversight, my services would not be required. The chances of my offering to help that committee again are very small... they will have to come to me. This is a normal human reaction — they hurt my feelings. People seldom give someone two chances to do that.

4.If you hear of someone with a special talent, don't sit back and grumble, "Sue is an artist — she should volunteer to work with publicity." Go to Sue and ask her! "I heard you're a wonderful artist. We sure could use your talents on our flyers. We need something clever to promote our dances."

If you're not using the resources of your entire club, you're wasting precious abilities. I realize there are always a few "lazy" ones, but the majority are merely waiting to be asked. If they don't feel like a part of the club, but merely someone who pays dues, they won't feel comfortable. Make them a club member, not just someone who shows up once in a while.

The word "exhibition," according to Mr. Webster, means "a public show or display, as of art." Who's to argue? The exhibition groups coming to Louisville for the 32nd National S/D Convention are artful indeed. If you've ever been to a national convention and seen these people do their shows, you know what we mean. If you haven't, consider this your invitation,

Among the groups who definitely will perform at the square dance extravaganza June 23-25 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center are:

The world-famous Cowboy Hall of Fame dancers from Oklahoma;

The squarenaders, a precision dance team from California;

A youth unicycle square dance team from Ohio;

Two wheelchair square dance groups;

The Maycroft Square Tappers, a youth exhibition square dance group from Michigan.

And remember, those are just a few of the groups that will be performing all three days of the convention.

How often will they perform? Often.

Take Thursday, June 23, for example. There will be exhibitions in the Coliseum from 4 to 5 pm and from 6 to 7, in Broadbent Arena from 3 to 4 and 6:30 to 7:30, in the East Wing from 4 to 4:30 and 8 to 8:20, in East Hall from 9:15 to 9:30, 9:30 to 9:40 and 9:40 to 10, in West Hall from 9:30 to 9:40 and in the West Wing from 8 to 9 and 9:15 to 9:30.

The same schedule will prevail Friday, June 24, then we get serious on the last day of the convention. Ten different halls will be in use and exhibitions will be staged continuously beginning in mid-afternoon Sat., June 25, with as many as five or six halfs having exhibitions simultaneously.

If you appreciate good exhibition dancing, Louisville is the place to be in '83. Would we lie?

#### LOUISVILLE IS THE END OF THE TRAIL, BUT NOT THE END OF THE DANCING

Going to get to Louisville early for the 32nd National S/D Convention June 23-25? Good, we've got some trail-end dances scheduled for you when you get here.

For the youth dancers, the hours are 8 to 10:30 and the site is poolside at the Executive West. Ah, youth. It could give a whole new meaning to dive in.

That sounds like fun. Do you think 39 is too old to be considered a youth? Do you believe the guy at the typewriter is 39 years old? Do you want to buy a bridge?

Dear Editor:

I have read a number of reports on square dancing in an earlier era. Some are not particularly complimentary. I wish to bring attention to readers my early experiences as they reflect well on square dancing.

I was born and brought up in the Middlebury, Vt. area of French-Canadian parentage. We were a large family as was typical of those farm families. As my older brothers and sisters reached their teen years, my parents looked for ways to have them entertained under good supervision. Together with a number of other farm families, they started a regular schedule of Sunday night square dances each taking a turn in doing the hosting. Among the families were a couple of musicians and one with the courage to learn calling. During the middle 1930's this was my introduction to square dancing. As the young people matured the home parties were replaced by Sat. night dances in New Haven Town Hall or Bristol Garden, In the early 1940's the dances were very much like our current 2 plus 2 dances. We had two squares followed by round dancing, informally. After two songs we returned to square dancing. All the square dances were formal singing calls with a strict pattern. I don't ever remember thinking of the dances as dull. One of the benefits of easy dancing was the fact that we could take dates to dances who had never square danced yet show them a good time.

World War II brought an end to those dances for me. After returning I went to Hartford, Ct., married, and raised a family. We returned frequently to visit relatives and on a few occasions were fortunate enough to attend Sat. night dances then at Lake Bomoseen. My wife, Helen, had never seen such dancing yet had no

difficulty. We joined the Allemande 8's in Manchester, NH shortly after moving here as our children were then old enough to be home alone. A few years after graduating in square dancing we took up round dancing and still attend lessons weekly after all these years because we just enjoy. I tell people that I enjoy round dancing but have fun square dancing. Reflecting on the past, that was just the experience gained from early Vt. dancing.

We have attended formal square dances previously in Vermont but we look forward to this year's convention as a coming home experience. My early Vermont square dancing experience was anything but wild. I resent having it portrayed in that manner. What can be better than dancing on Saturday nights to a live band playing Glenn Miller tunes for round dancing and swinging singing square dance tips in a totally healthy atmosphere.

#### DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Richard and Anita Wylle, 94 Mountainview St., Chicopee, were the recipients of the 1983 Distinguished Service Award for outstanding service to the square and round dance activity in Western Mass. The award was received at ceremonies held Sunday, Feb. 28, at the Quality Inn Ballroom in Chicopee.

The Wylie's involvement with the S/D activity in Western Mass., started in 1968, as members of the Silver Wing Stompers Club at Westover Air Force Base. In 1969, Richard was on the convention proposal committee, along with two callers, who successfully outbid Hartford for the New England Convention.

They have been members and officers of the Silver Wing Stompers, Chic-Mates, Westside Stompers, and most recently, program chairman for the Chicopee SDC. They are also members of Waltz Whirlers round dance club in Chicopee.

Printers of the monthly Western Mass. S/D Calendar since 1972, their involvement in the publicity of the activity includes handling the 1970 and 1971 New England convention. They also were editors for the 1980 through 1982 Fall Festival program booklet.

In 1981, their dream of having a dance team perform, and show the history of folk dancing in the Conn. Valley became a reality. The American Heritage Dancers were formed, and much of the research, costume, and production were done by Richard and Anita.

More than a year, and miles of traveling, went into the research of the dances and the costumes. Anita spent hours in libraries and museums and finally was able to make patterns, and then the actual clothes worn by the people of the late 1700's and early 1800's.

A monthly column 'A-Round the Square,' is written by Richard and published in the Chicopee Herald, and the Country Music Record magazine.

The awards ceremonies featured a sit-down dinner, the award presentations and a three-hour square dance. Judging for the selection of the awards was done by the staff of the S/D Directory, based in Jackson, Mississippi.

During the latter part of 1982, square dancers and the callers and cuers nominated people in each of the categories, and their backgrounds forwarded to the judges.

This is the third such D.S.A. award, since its inception in 1980, when it was felt that those who have helped the square dance movement over the years should be recognized by their peers.

Along with the Distinguished Service Award, three meritorious service awards were presented in the categories of S/D caller, R/D teacher/cuer, and a club.

#### MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD - CALLER

Receiving the award in the Caller class was Louis Taddia, 5 Delano Drive, Springfield, Mass. A caller for 23 years, Taddia has served the square dancers and the Springfield Area Caller Assoc. well. He was their secretary for two years, and President for two years, along with a delegate to the N.E. Caller Council for four years.

Lou was on the staff of the '70-'71 N. E. Convention when it was held in Springfield, and on the staff of the past seven Fall Festivals held each winter in downtown Springfield.

He is the club caller for the 'Vagabonds' SDC in the Springfield/Chicopee area, and the Rainbow Strollers in Enfield, and Happy Hoofers in E. Hartford, CT.

Taddia, when just starting out in calling back in the early 1960's, was the resident caller for two years for the old 'Western Jamboree' program aired each Sunday morning on Channel 40. He has, through the years, been the voice of square dancing, having been on radio and TV spots promoting the activity.

#### MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD - CUER

Tom and Donna Meyer, 2 Belle Avenue, Enfield, Ct., received the Meritorious Service Award for round dance cuers. This couple is unique, in that both Tom & Donna take turns doing the cueing, or prompting of the figures while couples round dance.

Active in both the Ct. and Western N.E. Round Dance Teachers Assoc., the Meyers have served as President, Screening Delegates, and educational clinic chairmen of the Ct. Assoc. They were secretary of the Western N.E. Assoc. in 1980 and 1981.

The Meyers are currently round dance instructors for the Hampden Promenaders and Musical Squares, and the Ludiow Round, National Carousels Chapter 34, and the Cue-A-Couple R/D Clubs.

#### MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD - CLUB

The Vagabonds Square Dance Club, which was started in 1965, and dances at the Square and Round Dance Center in Chicopee, received the Meritorious Service Award for a club.

An active club for the last seventeen years, the Vagabonds have provided much leadership for many of the area's activities, with many members on the yearly fall festival committee.

Vagabonds are known for their unusual dances and events, and run ho-downs, sleigh rides, special holiday dances, and two camp-and-dance weekends each year.

The club holds their yearly classes at Sunshine Village, and holds benefit dances to support that facility for the retarded.

A New Dancer award was received by Roger & Jeannine Pelchat of 135 Catherine St., Chicopee. Members of the Dancing Shadows square dance clubs, the Pelchats are active in the club, and are the class coordinator, and chairman for the club's 'beginner' dance.

The non-dancer award to a person who has helped the square dance movement went to Mary T. Phelon, of Westfield. The Hampden County 4-H advisor to the Barnyard Bunch teen SDC, Mary has devoted time over the years to the betterment of the teens, and other people.

Phelon organized, and advises the 'Country Corkflakes' SDC of physically and mentally handicapped dancers. She also is a volunteer worker for the Special Olympics, and runs the Hampden County 4-H service club.

The award for Public Service to the square dance activity went to the Springfield Newspapers, for their years of running stories, and features on the promotion of this dance entity.

The awards were sponsored by the Western Mass, Cooperation Committee, and attended by over 150 dancers, callers, instructors, and representatives of the area Square and Round Dance Clubs.

## CHALLENGE RAMBLINGS

Bob Marsh in his March column asked me to bring him up to date on what Challenge dancing is like. In fact, his statements were very close to the way I view challenge dancing. It just seemed that the overall tone or impression one was left with is that challenge dancing is unpleasant and distasteful, and how could anybody consider doing it?

Bob's comments will be in italics. If you want more challenge and are able to attend more workshops, you can consider A level which is a stepping stone to C dancing. There are many callers who do not consider Advanced level to be a stepping stone to Challenge. In much the same way that Mainstream doesn't have to be a stepping stone to Plus. I believe that the emphasis placed on the various aspects of square dancing (e.g. style of calling, choreography, singing calls, rounds, workshops) are different at the different levels. This means that Advanced is a different level than Challenge, and that there are people who would enjoy Advanced and not enjoy either Mainstream or Challenge.

Tips were 20 minutes long with a 10 minute rest and no singing calls and no rounds. When I call, I set my timer for 10 minute tips and 5 minute breaks. However, other challenge callers that I know have 15 minute tips and breaks can stretch to 10 minutes. As at Mainstream, when tips become too long, dancers complain among themselves and sometimes to the caller. The absence of singing calls and rounds is because the majority of challenge dancers are interested in challenge choreography. However, there are challenge singing calls. These are singing calls whose figures include the challenge calls. There is one caller who specializes in Challenge singing calls. Challenge dances and weekends are often ended with a singing call. I haven't seen much round dancing at the challenge level. There are challenge dancers who also round dance. At one C2 workshop for which I called, we had rounds.

If you could dance 70% of the calls it was considered successful. The survey last month had a question on this subject. (If you haven't sent the survey in yet, please do so.) From the answers I have seen, and from talking to dancers, they seem to want a success rate between 70% and 80%. I believe that this number is going up. There has been more of an emphasis on smooth choreography and dancing at the challenge level than there has been in the past. However, this is puzzle solving, and if everyone gets the puzzle, maybe it was too easy.

Groups were smaller, more intent and serious, and don't expect anyone to pull you thru. You might even be asked to stay home. Most of the tape group workshops in this area have 6 couples in them. Tape workshops with more than one square are very hard to run successfully. The live groups have 3 squares at C3 and 2 squares at C4. When I travel, I usually see about 6 squares at a C2 dance, 334 couples attended the last National Challenge Convention. As for the pulling and staying home issue, I think that Bob was trying to say that you had better know the level before you attempt an outside dance at that level. I would not be very happy having someone who just finished Mainstream attempting to dance in my Pius square. First they should practice Mainstream (Callerlab recommends a year), then attend a Plus workshop, and then consider attending an outside Plus dance.

If you become interested in C dancing make sure that you attend a few dances as a spectator. If you become interested in Challenge, you are probably attending Advanced dances on a regular basis, and have seen C1 dancing at the asterisk tips. Find a good C1 workshop. The caller should both clean up any dancing problems you may have left over from Advanced and teach you all of the C1 calls in a logical order.

If your partner or spouse is not equally interested, it will be tough sledding. It will mean dedicating most of your free time towards learning. When your partner has either a greatly differing interest or ability level, there can be problems. This doesn't seem to happen too often, and when it does, couples usually find a way to work things out. I hope that most people involved in the challenge activity spend some amount of time learning. That is partly what challenge dancing is all about.

## DANCING FOR THE PUBLIC

Demonstrations of square dancing before the general public generate much good will when they are done well. Advance preparations by dancers and callers are most important and should never be neglected. Because of television, theaters, schools, radio, newspapers and other mass education media, dancers must remember that they will be performing for a very sophisticated audience, one that expects to see a well trained group. Here are basic instructions given to new dancers that may help others in exhibitions to dance smoothly.

- 1. STAND TALL- Look Alert.
- a. Feet together, back straight
- b. Shoulders back
- c. No talking to partner or others
- d. No gum chewing.
- e. Men stand one half step behind girls, hands clasped behind back, arms straight.
- f. Girls' skirts held out at sides, with two hands, elbows against body.
- 2. All look straight ahead, listening

carefully for music.

3. Smile, look pleasant and assured.

When dancing everyone must be in square dance apparel and everyone must use the same styling:

- a. Only back to back do-sa-dos.
- b. Twirl girls only when told to— most dances at end of dance only.
- c. Swing only when told to.
- d. SMILE square dancing is fun.
- e. Dance to the music, don't rush the call.
- t. Right and left grand: all must reach out, get hands waist high.
- g. Circle left or right: keep hands shoulder high to girls; walk with no hip wiggles; maintain circle by holding arms rigid.
- h. At end of dance, acknowledge partner and corners; do not applaud.
- i. Never use club gimmickery, i.e., trick moves, kicks, patty cakes, hip bumps, grinds, smooches, and other solo acts that distract viewers' attention from the group's dance, confuse other dancers, or embarrass them before the audience.

It is just about the first of April already and time to start thinking of warmer weather. The latest I hear is that some square dancers are fooling around with the idea of cooler fashions for men. Men have been getting away with the open collar for a while, but there is still concern about the long sleeve shirt. Many dancers feel that "offensively sweaty" forearms would be eliminated by allowing men to wear short sleeves and thereby remain cooler. Whether or not short sleeves would eliminate "glowing" forearms or not is up for dehate (or experiment), but it sure would allow men to be more confortable in the hot weather.

The solutions being proposed tend toward the days of more tradition and formality. Wouldn't it be nice if women again wore longer skirts and white gloves. Think of the advantages. ## The Problem With Dance History

When a question in dance history comes up, I usually want to know what has been written about it. Sometimes I find contradictions or inaccurate information. Given how much we rely upon the written word, this certainly is a problem.

For example, consider the Pilgrims and Puritans. Many believe that they were very stern people who frowned upon recreation and the arts, especially music and dance. Along with this go stories about harsh and unreasonable "blue laws" governing the details of personal life. This image is so ingrained that even today some persons in responsible positions accept it without examination.

Recently, after seeing our Vagabonds' Historical Dances Program, one of the curators of a museum in Boston and I began corresponding. The museum is mounting a major new exhibition about 17th century New England. In our initial conversation, he told me quite firmly that the Pilgrims did not dance and that in fact they forbade it. He challenged me to find original references to counter him. I did, but I also found many respected books which agreed with him. Here is a massive misunderstanding of important dimensions and implications.

The best study of this problem I have found is *The Puritons and Music in England and New England* by Percy A. Scholes (Russell & Russell, Inc. New York, 1962; first printed 1934). It is a detective story written in an urbane, often witty, and very English style.

Puritans and Pilgrims were everyday English people who had differences of opinion with the Anglican Church. They participated fully in the life of their times, including arts and recreation. (Oliver Cromwell, the Puritan leader of the English Commonwealth, had music and dance in his personal and public life. In fact, the first dance book in England, John Playford's The English Dancing Master, was published in 1651 during his rule.) They were concerned about the propriety of their activities according to time and place, and valued education (in the 1500's and 1600's literacy was not widespread). The laws of early New England were probably the most humane of their time. The "blue laws" were perpetrated after the Puritian era by a pro-Tory minister in Ct. who had a bad case of "sour grapes"!

Read it all in Percy Scholes' book, and in the chapter about dance, savor the story taken from the diary of the Puritan Bulstrode Whitelocke, sent by Cromwell to represent the English government at the Court of Queen Christiana of Sweden — especially the part where, by his dancing, he proves himself a gentleman in her eyes.

This is important because a major portion of the history of England and the United States is distorted in many areas — social, legal and artistic. As adults, we have a responsibility to wonder about accuracy and to try to pass on the truth. If a century or more can be so misrepresented, what else is?

If we believe that dance is important ( I do), then to pass along incorrect information is a particular disservice. Just because something is in print is no guarantee that it is correct (even this!). Don't jump for the easy answer. Do ask; "How does she/he know?" "What are his/her sources?" When is a statement a hunch, a repetition of someone else's ideas, or a hypothesis?

How does this apply in today's round dancing? Just the same, particularly as our growing pains and controversies about the "right" way to dance are discussed. Perhaps being clear about what is a preference, an opinion, even a wish, will help discussions to go more smoothly and that is, in my opinion, a direct benefit.

I'll close with a quote from the Puritan poet, John Milton, who wrote in his L'Allegro:

Come and trip it as you go On the light fantastic toe

So, the next time you make some quip about "tripping the light fantastic," remember the Puritans!





Plus 1 & 2 or Plus?

COSTUME KIT

The outfits, designed by Gene Novak, portray the historical period of our "Constitution State."

The women's attire will be a sleeveless, blue dress with a bustle in the back and a short white dotted swiss jacket. A small white lace jabot dresses the neckline. The dress will be complemented by white crinoline, pettipants and shoes.

The men's attire is the blue vest with white lapels trimmed in gold and red braid and gold buttons. A white ruffled shirt or dickey, blue tie, white pants and shoes are suggested. Bone or light tan shoes are acceptable.

MATERIALS: The dress is of the Burlington Klopman Highsign dacron-cotton in the shade of Back Bay Blue. The jacket is flocked white dotted swiss lined in white dacron-cotton broadcloth. Trim on the dress is white eyelet lace and copen blue grosgrain ribbon.

The men's vest is the Burlington Klopman Trigger in Back Bay Blue, lined in the matching Super Keynote Plus, which also makes up the tie. The lapels of the vest are of white Chino.

You can purchase extra buttons at most any fabric shop that carries the Streamline notions. Samples of either dress or vest trim will be sent upon request to Gene Novak.



THIS KIT CONTAINS: For the dress - the completed hemmed and trimmed section of the skirt bottom, plus 3½ yds. of the blue Highsign dacron-cotton. For the jacket - 1½ yds. white flocked dotted swiss, 1 yd. of white broadcloth lining, lace and ribbon for the sleeve band, 3 gold

buttons and elastic. A lace jabot for the neckline and 2 sections of the bustle complete the outfit.



\*NOTE: The bustle is simply a width of fabric tied into a conventional bow knot, drawing the looped sections of the bow out further than the ends. Turn the bow vertically and droop the folds of the bow over the ends. Hand sew snaps or a strip of velcro onto the inside knot section of the bow, and onto the dress at either side of the zipper at just above the waistline. Tack the folds of the bow lightly in place so they don't flop.

FOR THE VEST: 1 2/3 yds. blue Trigger, 2 yds of the lining Super Keynote Plus will include the tie, and ½ yd, of white Chino for the lapels, 4½ yds, of braid and 24 small buttons plus 2 large buttons for the tails of the vest complete it.

#### NOTIONS YOU WILL NEED TO PURCHASE:

- A blue zipper and snaps or velcro for the bustle.
- Interfacing for the lapels and a button & loop fastener for the inside of the vest if desired.

## Square Beat



A dance club offering the most in program variety in an atmosphere of harmonious effort and enthusiasm will draw from a much wider source than will a club catering to specific tastes only.

Harold & Dot Wiles, of Derry, NH are long time friends and Harold cues rounds locally and believes that round dancing improves square dancing by providing a balanced program of fun and personal satisfaction. Square dancing supplies the fun and satisfaction of a spontaneous group effort while rounds supply the satisfaction of a developed team effort. Together they provide a balance that makes an evening of dancing fun and enjoyable.

It has always been our feeling that square and round dancing are an integral part of the activity and a part of the same family. Clubs that feature 2+2 (2 squares alternated with 2 rounds throughout the evening) are the ones that attract the dancers.

Our research tells us that in 1830 a little Bohemian peasant girl began humming a catchy little tune and skipped around to it that eventually spread from the village girls into every dancing salon in Prague and took on the name Polka which refers to the little half step used.

In 1843 it moved into the ballrooms of France and England and led to the inauguration of the present style round dancing. The term "round dancing" applied to ballroom dancing as performed by couples who freely choose their own pattern of steps to varied rhythms and to early day stately stylized European dances with set patterns. American round dances are a unique combination of the two, with the addition of a leader who "cues" the movements while the dancers are performing them. This type of round dancing grew out of the great surge of interest in square dancing that began in the forties and is still going strong. Many popular tunes are used as bases

for round dance routines.

A letter to the Editor of the New England Caller caught our attention in search of answers for increased attendance of dancers to support a club. We have found that over the years a club's operating success goes in cycles - it has its good years and then its tough times. Undoubtedly a small club with limited finances is going to struggle - but our advice is to try to hang in there - it will get better.

The key is to concentrate on the development of a good beginners class that can bring a breath of fresh air to any club. We also fully realize it is easier said than done.

Through the column we are suggesting all our clubs and dancers looking to go on a visitation or banner raid to consider attending a Lakeside Swingers of Laconia dance, as a boost to their attendance. The Square Dance world mourns the passing of Ed Ross Smith who succumbed to a massive heart attack on Friday, March 18, 1983.

On rare occasions a man comes along

We all are much richer for Ed Ross Smith.

Ed's constant search for ideas and his "let's try it" attitude effected all who knew him. His corny jokes, broad smile and hearty greetings will be missed.

A book could be written on Ed Ross Smith's influence in the square dance activity. His leadership accomplishments and innovative ideas have had a tremendous effect on the New England and National Square Dance Community.

He and Judy founded the Wenham Shindiggers and Acton Square Wheeler Square Dance Clubs and at the time of his death he was still Club Caller for the Square Wheelers. Ed was a charter member of the Tri-State Callers Association and one of the organizers of NECCA, The New England Co-Operation Committee and the Square Dance Foundation of New England. He served as Treasurer of these organizations, as President of Tri-State, Chairman of NECCA and Chairman of the Co-Op Committee.

Ed and Judy were responsible for the creation of the New England Leadership Conference and served as Committee Chairman of the first three conferences.

They have been involved in leadership on the National level as members of the executive board of Legacy and Chairman of that organization's Leadership Committee. Their work on the Legacy Leadership Manual, which was done during a period when Ed could not see to read, speaks for itself.

The dancers have recognized their contribution to Square Dancing by making them Honorary Members of several clubs and by awarding them New England's highest form of recognition, the Yankee Clipper Award.

Our sympathy and love are extended to his wife Judy and their family.



Graduation time is near (or past) and enthusiastic "new" dancers will be trying their skills at "real" dances (as distinct from "class level" dances.) This is an exciting time and perhaps it would be helpful for all to pause a few minutes to remember what those first few dances after graduation felt like.

Socially, they felt a lot like a skydiver's first jump and there may be a lot we can do to help overcome that first time panic.

In particular, I have made one observation repeatedly in the 36 years since my "first jump." (In those days there weren't any classes — you learned by going to a dance.) That observation is that most people who survive the class/club transition to become experienced dancers had help. There is usually another couple who took them in tow to those first few dances. They pushed them through the door, dragged them onto the floor, found experienced people for them to dance with and took them out for coffee to lick the wounds after the dances. They explained that some callers LIKE to break down the floor and others call boring routines or wear you out with stop-go timing. They pointed out the people who dance so poorly they have to blame their mistakes on someone else and the ones who've always had a drink or two before the dance. In short, the survivors had someone who acted as a guide to help them through the jungle out there.

If you think back, you can probably remember who served as your guide and some of the ways they helped. I urge you now — RIGHT NOW — to return the favor. Someone out there needs help. Your hard-won experience can help them over this most difficult time in the square dance experience.

Won't you share your knowledge — give a little time? Don't try to help everyone. Pick a couple or two and make their successful transition to experienced dancer your personal project. It's a job only you can do. The class advisors can help generally, but in the transition the new dancers need more specific, personal help. Most of all they need to be encouraged and accompanied to dances.

We all know our classes are too short. Much of what the new dancer needs to know and much of the confidence-building practice must come "on the job." They need a coach, a confident, a buddy and sometimes even a shoulder to cry on. You know the prize is worth the struggle. Help a graduate to know it too. Please help!

We shall be forever indebted to Turkey Town Trotters! Not only did they let us raid them; they also sent a letter of recommendation to the Town Travelers telling them how much they enjoyed dancing with us, and how well everyone behaved.

Town Travelers then called and invited us to Raid them, and again we were received with many praises.

Pelham Partners also accepted a raid from us and were very gracious. Soon we will be visiting Heel and Toe.

However, our success story is not all happiness. One club has refused to allow us to raid because we are teens and another said, "Oh, you don't want us; you want the teens."

Have square dancers become calloused? Are not teens who square dance, the possible strong future of the adult clubs? Is there a valid reason why the ages 13-20 are not able to participate in all the fun and friendliness that is offered to those aged 21-100?

Most teen clubs are becoming hard pressed to remain operational. Is one reason because the "kids" are bored with being confined to one hall for seven years with little support or interest from the adult world?

By some stroke of luck or Divine Providence, we have 50 young people who call us "Mum" and "Dad" and kiss and hug us hello and good-bye. They come every week! They volunteer for committees! They run their own dances! The officers do all their own jobs! The advisors only advise!

These 50 Teen Travelers really do want to meet you. They want the chance to dance at your club. They want you to dance at their club. Please give them an opportunity to enter the real world of square dancing!

If you would like them to raid your club, please call or drop us a line.

In conclusion, we have a bumper sticker on our car that reads: "Square Dancing is Friendliness Set to Music." Should we add to it . . . "But only if you are over 21?"

Co-sponsored by the Bloomfield adult club, this dance drew about 20 sets, including over 50 teens from 5 teen clubs in Ct. and Mass. Then came our 13th annual graduation dance on March 11, at which our caller/teacher Suptei Rogers awarded diplomas to a dozen and called for 8 sets. We've had a lot of fun and invite you to join us at our dances.



I just got back from the 10th annual Callerlab Convention in Philadelphia. There were nearly 800 attendees this year.

To those of us who have been around square dancing for more than ten years, Callerlab seems like a new idea that is finally finding a place in our activity. To those of us who have been dancing for fewer than ten years, it feels as if Callerlab has been around since 1776. Either way you perceive it, if you were fortunate enough to have been there, I'm sure you would have come away with a feeling of awe, admiration, pride, respect and exhaustion. To see committees of 30 to 70 people get together. express views, opinions and attitudes of how their parts of the country operate, and eventually compromise on what they feel is best for all, can make a believer out of you. To then see the committee chairman at the end of the convention present the recommendations of his committee, to the entire membership and have them voted on, makes you want to follow the decisions of the group, even if they differed from your original thoughts.

The votes that most dancers are generally interested in are how the different programs (levels) have been changed. Here is a summary. There were no changes to the mainstream list, There was one addition to the plus list, and that was a variation of a call that is already on

the list. We added explode and (anything). The advanced and challenge lists are due for their biannual mail vote this fall, so there are no changes there. The mainstream quarterly selection list dropped Hinge & Flutter. This left the following calls on the list: Chain Down The Line, Dixie Derby, Linear Cycle, Red Hot, Divide to a Column, and, with a reasonably divided vote, Grand Spin.

The Plus Quarterly Selection program voted to drop both calls on the list, namely Zing and Track to a Diamond. They announced the selection for the current quarter. It is Track and (anything). We'll look at Track and (anything) next month.

Those calls remaining on the advanced quarterly selection list are Mini Busy, Cross Double Your Pleasure, and Linear Action. Dropped from the list were Double Your Pleasure, Bridge the Gap and Z Coordinate.

It was voted to discontinue the quarterly selection program at the Challenge level. Instead, a newsletter will be circulated, telling which experimental calls are currently being used.

The big issue, as you may have guessed, or at least hoped, was whether to leave the plus lists combined into one list. Some areas danced either mainstream or plus 2, so were not greatly affected. Many parts of the country, however, like New England, were in turmoil due to last year's decision to combine +1 & +2. After much discussion, it was decided to continue the way it is for at least another year or two before re-evaluating the system. The original decision was made, knowing that in order to achieve long term benefits, we would probably suffer some short term confusion, and we are still hoping for the long term benefits. Only time will tell.

One reply to my April First article was from a man who insisted on his Right to Bare Arms. Are we getting too belligerent? How can we keep our cool?

### The Direction of our Caller's Training

(A Minority Opinion)

The training of callers today is, in my opinion, the most important aspect of the square dance movement for the future of its very existence. It is this caller's feeling that too much training has gone in the wrong direction. The most important part of the training is practically non-existent!

The art of calling requires much more training in the area of music than we leaders are giving it. The very heart of all calling should start with the music to allow dancing the basics instead of just going through them with a hit or miss method. Methods of calling, such as sight, mental imagery, combinations of both, or memory itself are just that... methods. Formations such as box 1-4, 1P2P lines, twofaced lines, etc., are just that . . . formations ... and have nothing to do with the art of calling. Don't get me wrong. These are important matters to find out about and to maybe use someday, but the real matter of how to call has to do with the music as it pertains to choreography.

Where do we put the actual call in the music so that we don't lead the dancer too much, or make them wait? This is the heart of the matter and what's been overlooked. In our movement today, it is much easier to take the easy way out in our training of callers by teaching them what to call, rather than how to call correctly. The importance of music has been overlooked and pushed into the background so it won't "bother" the caller.

Have you ever wondered why this subject has been ignored? I suggest that you start by giving this some serious thought before square dancing becomes some other activity to be known as square games in puzzle solving. Think about it! Dancing requires music to move the feet in rhythm. It is also the only common denominator between the dancer and the caller. Any dance requires movement from the first beat of a phrase until the completion of the

dance, whether it be a fox trot, waltz, round dance, contra dance, rhumba, etc. If all dancing starts with the downbeat after the intro, then why should square dancing be excluded from this feeling? Why should square dancing be excluded from the same format that applies to all other dance? Why should square dancing suffer through hit or miss methods? We'd better start answering some of these questions before we find ourselves trying to explain to knowledgeable people in dance that square dancing is really not dancing, but a game we play with people in formations that have nothing to do with dancing as they know it. We should instead, be proud that it is dancing and we need to address ourselves to the fact that it can be danced, and danced correctly.

We have heard almost all our leadership say that we should be putting more emphasis on smoother dancing. This is impossible unless we have smoother calling. Neither is possible without the proper use of music! We need to commit ourselves to bring music to the forefront again and to start teaching our callers of tomorrow how to call to the music. Music is the KEY for this to happen, just as it has been the key to all dancing . . . It may be harder to call to the music, but it is the right way. The right way is usually harder to do in most instances, and square dancing and calling is no exception. It is my personal opinion that we need to make hard decisions soon. We can face the music (literally) or we can maintain the status quo. One decision will enable us to get on with the task of facing reality for the insurance of our dance structure, while the other will only enable us to drift along with the tide. I, for one, wish to go on record to do all I can to insure the future of square dancing, not necessarily as it is now, but as it could be! We have the leadership and organization to tackle this task, but do we have the guts?





I do hope all Square Dancers have a copy of the EDSARDA cookbook — so many great recipes are included. I especially enjoy trying the recipes of so many of my Square Dance friends.

The Co-President of EDSARDA, Shirley Russell, has a pound cake in the cookbook that is a good one for everyone to try.

### POUND CAKE

1 8-oz okg, cream cheese

1/2 lb. butter

2 cups self-rising flour

2 cups sugar

6 eggs

1 tsp. lemon flavoring

On the bottom of a greased tube pan, put:

1/2 cup finely chopped nuts

1 tsp. sugar

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

At a recent Foundation meeting, Ellie Chase, Co-Chairman of the New England Square Dance Foundation, brought with her some bars that were so good the dish was empty in short order. She has sent in the recipe for all of us to share. Ellie calls them:

### **NUTTY NUT BARS**

1/2 lb. butter

½ cup sugar 1 cup chopped walnuts

Graham cracker quarters to fill a wellgreased cookie sheet (10 x 15 is just right.) Ellie uses Sunshine Honey Grahams.

Break the grahams into quarters and place them close together in the cookie pan.

Melt butter and sugar. Bring to a hard boil and boil for 2 minutes only.

Remove from heat and stir in nuts. Spoon or pour over grahams.

Bake 10 minutes (<u>no longer</u>) in preheated oven — 350 degrees. Remove from pan onto racks immediately. Makes 40-48 bars.

Try it . . . you'll like it.

I am so glad that so many people liked the Spinach Ball recipe that was in the March Caller. I was happy to share it with you.

As long as you're dancing, enjoy it



### A MESSAGE TO FIRST YEAR DANCERS FROM

# archie Howell

Many new dancers either have or will soon be graduating and eagerly looking forward to dancing with their club, going on banner raids and going to conventions. As the saying goes, "I have good news and I have bad news." The above is the good news.

Now the bad news. Not all but most clubs close down for the summer. New dancers are, in most cases, told to get all the dancing experience they can, wherever they can, and come back to club in September. Learning continuity, if indeed there was any, ends.

September rolls around and the club opens with a "WELCOME BACK DANCE." The new dancers arrive, their faces beaming with joyful anticipation. The caller picks up the mike and square dance time is heralded with. "SQUARE 'EM UP!"

The first tip goes fine. The first year dancers feel confident and accepted.

The second tip went well even with "Load the Boat," but then it happened. Heads square thru, step to a wave, scoot back, boys trade, boys run. "WOW! We never had that!" The smiles disappear as frustration takes over and glares are intensified. Sad but true!

Last January a square dance student from another caller's class came to me and enthusiastically told me about learning "Follow your Neighbor!" Let's all just set back and do some serious thinking. What's wrong? CALLERLAB recommends 29 weeks of 2 to 2½ hours each session to learn the 4B basics or 41 weeks to learn the full mainstream program. Many callers, including myself, recommend new dancers dance at the mainstream level until they are comfortable before going on to the plus level. If only the new dancers would follow these simple guidelines the smiles would never fade and the glares would never develop. When the veteran dancer says to the new born dancer, "Come to club, we'll pull you through," they really mean PULL you through! Wouldn't it be nice if the new born dancer asked the veteran dancer to "Come to John Doe's mainstream dance with us," and the veteran dancer accepted and went along for the FUN of square dancing!

I am not oblivious to the extreme peer pressure thrust upon the new dancer or to the fact that most dancers were short changed in their class. Did you receive 41 sessions of 2-2½ hours to learn the mainstream figures? Think about it.

Some callers do have a heart and it breaks mine when I am calling a plus dance and I see dancers go through a "Tea cup Chain" and then panic on "Cast % — Boys Run."

True, we all blank out on a simple call now and then but that is normal and will always be.

I don't claim to have all the answers but I do have some thoughts on the subject. Wouldn't it be nice if all the callers, or at least most of the callers, ran summer dances at the mainstream level and gave the new dancers a chance to smooth out their dancing skills. The callers might even allot ½ hour to plus exposure to fight off the peer pressure!

I have harbored these thoughts for a long time but reading articles written by Jack Lasry and Jim Mayo has inspired me to put them down on paper. It's nice to know that other callers feel as I do.

To you, new dancer, why not talk to your own caller about running this type of dance in your area during the summer months?


New dancers that do participate in this type of program will find returning to club in Sept. an "ACCELERATING EXPERIENCE" and not an "EMBARRASSING DISASTER!"

## Chip's TIP



The comments made in the April CALLER by Veronica McClure should be posted big and large and read by many who perpetuate the myths of the past. The book titled May I Have the Pleasure, (Available from CDSS) is an excellent and easy-to-read dissertation on dance and destroys many false ideas about our dance history.

Henry Ford's Good Morning is a good collection of old time dances but is not to be used for 18th century work. Damon's The History of Square Dancing is much quoted but is not accurate in a number of places. (See the article in the Lloyd Shaw Foundation publication The American Dance Circle, Volume 3, Number 1, February 1983.

I have been a student of American Indian dance, culture and crafts for over 36 years and constantly come up against people who have believed the Hollywood image and are sometimes annoyed at a presentation of the real thing.

The particular dance clothes which I constructed and now wear while dancing represent what a western Sioux man wore between 1920 and 1930. More toward 1926 or so. (Yes, Indians are people and their clothing styles change, the same as the rest of the world.)

As Veronica sums it up: Question, question, question. Study and don't take any one source as gospel. Even quotes from a particular period.

For example: An American dancing master by the name of Rice who published in 1801 would lead you to believe that Americans were doing the Rigadoon step every 10 seconds. His work is not typical of what is published by other Americans around the same time.

Looking further in the CALLER I noted Don Beck's comments on bare arms. The old, old "pigeon wing" ("Hippie handshake", if you will.) works beautifully if the dancers equalize tension between each other when turning. And you CAN turn easily and smoothly in four steps. Traditional dancers have been doing it for a long time. Only hands are used so the whole business of sweaty wrists/arms for the men and ladies is eliminated.

My only comments about the Dancing for the Public article would be in general agreement except it sort of sounds all quite formal. Someone once said: "The best way to make a good impression is not to try."

Jim Mayo's words are well chosen and commenting on them could be a whole column. Philosophy and ways of looking at life would be brought in. His words are worth reading and re-reading. By both Club and Traditional leaders and dancers, because taking away the specific technique leaves you with people and similar problems in both disciplines.

Fran and I got to see our old friend Dick Leger in March on one of those rainy, rainy nights when only square dancers and other strange beings go out and brave the elements.

As always, Dick was leading the dancers onto the phrase. The conclusion of his two-part article again stresses the importance of music in dancing. All dancing. Any kind of dancing. If you don't use the music and its phrases why bother to use music at all? Some sort of metronome-like beat would do well

The concepts of left brain and right brain useage are filtering down to the public level. In general, Left-brained people are verbal, logical, analytical and lineal in their thinking. Right-brained people, on the other hand, indentify strongly with music, creativity, intuition and non-verbal thinking. (One can use, or learn to use, both sides of the brain cooperatively. Which seems to be what nature intended.) Neither type is "better" than the other but perhaps some callers, leaders and dancers are in the wrong type of activity due to their style of thinking.

Bob Marsh's piece about "special" tips brought back memories. I handled it in different ways over the years. One question I used to ask the minority requestors was whether they had paid extra at the door for the special treatment.

The best to you all as the warm weather comes upon us. Perhaps we'll meet somewhere. Take care.

### LET'S DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT ....

Subject: Why Not Let The Dancers Decide?

I notice that there are more and more communications taking place in the Caller. This is an important and healthy sign. When writing an article of suggestions or complaints I find I have to be on guard at all times to prevent my own personal interest taking charge. I try to base all decisions on what is best for square dancing and sometimes this may be against your best friend's wishes or your own desires. With that in mind let us take a good look and fair assessment, of round dance programming at square dances.

NECORTA screens and recommends rounds each quarter. This is not an easy job. If round dance cuers select 2 easy, 2 easy intermediate, 2 intermediate and the one oldie but goodie it amounts to 28 new rounds each year. Let us add to that the 12 rounds published in The Caller each year and the 15 square dancers rounds voted on by round dance leaders, our total is now 55 rounds. At a square dance evening with a 2 + 2 program there is time for 14 to 16 rounds. What happens to the balance?

Incidentally, the round dance appearing in The Caller is not the round of the month nor was it ever intended to be. It was given this handle by Round dance leaders. Actually, it is a round selected by Dick Doyle well in advance of publication and it is the round that comes the closest to meeting Dick's criteria based on many years experience. Unfortunately he doesn't find a "Tips of my Fingers" or "All .

Night" very often so he has to choose from what's available. Later the dancers will accept it or reject it according to their participation.

Here are some questions to answer which might give you a better insight to round dance programming.

Do you think a cuer is acting in the best interest of the club when he allows 3 or 4 couples to occupy the floor because of a request or his own desires?

Would you criticize the cuer who changes the record when only a few dancers join the circle?

Do you think that a cuer has the right to refuse a request of an old classic because he is bored with cueing it so many times?

Have you ever listed the number of rounds (not including classics) that you have learned in the past 3 years and are still dancing?

Have you refrained from learning to round dance because many are discarded so soon?

All these questions are based on complaints I have heard over the years.

Now let's get down to the Nitty Gritty. The dancer pays the bill for all the expenses and the dancer is the customer. As long as the cuer caters to the majority he has to be doing a good job. Of course, there will be 3 or 4 couples that will go home unhappy.

WE FACED THE CHALLENGE and started to do something about it. I'm talking about the excellent job NSSARDA is doing to encourage their clubs to plan mainstream

dances and all the other clubs who are getting together to provide mainstream dances for their areas including some good summer programs to keep our new graduates dancing mainstream.

This year Callerlah's theme was "Dancers — Our Prime Consideration" and from what I saw and heard at this year's convention, they really mean it. Lets continue to support them with our co-operation and I believe that down the road we'll be glad we did.

Please notice that I haven't used the word level at all. We voted at Callerlab to replace the word "level" with the word "program" and I think that's great.

Dear Editor:

I can't help but wonder if there isn't a conspiracy brewing among some of our square dance callers in the Mass. North Shore area. For two months in succession we've been blasted with some very adverse criticism concerning "banner-raiding" in and among our local clubs.

In a March N.E. Caller article it was Don Beck and in April it was Ray Aubut, (I wonder who's going to be next on the bandwagon?) Don has categorized all of the banner raiders as a group of "stuffed jackasses" who very seldom, if ever, attend a dance that they would enjoy. Ray is going much deeper and suggesting that banner raiding is causing many of the problems that our clubs are faced with.

Just to re-iterate, the banner raiders and/ or the banner chairman are keeping people from joining the square dance activity to begin with, causing poor attendance on class nights, workshops, club dances and other functions, "burning out" the dancers by forcing them out on raids every Sat. night, attending dances featuring poor callers and lousy halls, not going to dances with your friends, and finally forcing our dancers out of the activity if they don't make a total commitment to banner-raiding.

I'll bet that all of you avid banner-raiders didn't realize that you have such a detrimental influence on our square dance activities. I'm sure that if you had even suspected that you were causing so many problems, your club would not have continued as participants in such an abhorrent program for the last dozen years or so. Obviously, what has appeared to us as quite a successful activity here on the North Shore is really only an illusion, and it's being suggested that we drop it.

Maybe we should drop it; after all, we don't need any extra squares at our monthly club dances, we don't need that camaraderie that's been built up among our banner raiders over the years, we don't need to visit our friends at other clubs on a regular basis, we don't need a change of scenery, we don't need those interruptions at dances for the presentation of banners, and we don't even have to appear to be enjoying the dances we attend. What do you think fellow banner-raiders - is it time for us to wise up and throw in the towel?

For the life of me, I can't really determine the intent behind these two recent articles. I wish the callers would leave things that are the club's concern to the clubs, and use their divine guidance to resolve some of the problems that the callers and their associations are causing in the square dance activity. We would both be better off if they did.

### "Shop Talk" COUNTERPOINT

I can't arrive at any reasonable conclusion as to why the article should have been published ten years ago, let alone be repeated now. Is there so little happening in the square dance activity these days that there are no fresh current topics worth writing about? Why repeat a ten year old useless article? If only a very few people in an area with a dense square dancer population commented favorably on the article in 1972, and the intervening years have passed with no apparent effect, why resurrect these comments? What is the intent?

It's fine that you take the opportunity on a regular basis to express your opinions on the various happenings in the square dance activity; but I think in this case you are over-stepping your bounds with your profuse comments and generalizations about "banner raiding" among clubs. This is an area that is absolutely none of your business. How a dancer-run club or an area association chooses to conduct their internal operations, functions and activities is strictly their own concern, not yours. Are the Caller's Associations now awarding degrees in psychiatry to their members so that they can now diagnose the needs of the dancers and tell them what they really should be doing to enjoy (Continued)

themselves? If you are narrow-minded enough to think that it is strictly the caller that determines whether a dance is successful or not, or whether the dancers will enjoy themselves or not, you obviously are not too observant of the people involved in the square dance activity right here in your own area. There are a multitude of reasons for attending a dance - "who is doing the calling" is only one of them. We could try an experiment to determine whether banner raiding is beneficial or not, and to whom. Why don't you propose to the various Caller's Associations that for the next year all callers' fees for dances in the Mass. North Shore area be determined on the basis of not including banner raiders in the attendance count? We might also consider eliminating from the count those couples that are attending the dance only for the rounds. Obviously, in the case of a flat fee, it won't matter, but where variable rates are in order, it may shed some light on the "drawing ability" of our "good callers." I think our North Shore Clubs would love this

arrangement, what about the callers?

It is not clear from the article whether the implication is that all of the callers in New England (with the exception of Don Beck, Earl Johnston and other "good" callers, of course) are the "Stuffed Jackasses," or is it all of the square dancers who participate in banner-raiding activities who are the real "Stuffed Jackasses." Maybe we're mutually meant to be in that category. If directed at the square dancers, we probably have some of the biggest "Stuffed Jackasses" in New England on the North Shore. There are a number of clubs who have many dancers who have participated in more than a hundred raids over the years with their fellow club members, and they don't appear to be even thinking about not participating in this enjoyable, worthwhile club activity.

### THEY'LL BE OFF AND RUNNING IN THE 32ND NATIONAL FASHION SHOW

In case you don't think we take horse-racing seriously in Kentucky, drop in on the Fashion Show during your visit to the 32nd National Square Dance Convention June 23-25 in Louisville.

You might think you're at Churchill Downs, which is the idea.

The theme for the Fashion Show, which will be from noon to 1:30 p.m. on Sat. June 25, is "Thoroughbred Fashions." And Freedom Hall, the main arena at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center where the show will be held, will indeed be racy.

How racy, you ask? This racy, we answer:

There will be an exact replica of Churchill Downs, the home of the world-famous Kentucky Derby, including the historic twin spires. The "infield" will be carpeted, as will the "track," and the "winner's circle" will be made of flowers. The ushers will wear colorful jockey uniforms borrowed from Churchill Downs, there will be some rather spectacular lighting and some live horses will be trotted out at the finale.

There'll even be a tote board, but don't worry about it. The odds are that this show will go over big. You can't lose on this one.

Models from 37 states and Saudi Arabia will display the latest in square dance attire and there may be more than that by the time you get here. At last report, 48 couples, eight solos and one family had signed up to be models.

Dick Braun, a local radio personality, will be one of the narrators for the Fashion Show and entertainment will be provided by the Stephen Foster Story Singers from nearby Bardstown, Ky.

The show will be divided into six parts, each one named after an historic horse race. A live band will provide background music and there will also be some "surprise entertainment."

"We've been putting so much work into it I feel we should take this show on the road," said Willie Stigler, who with her husband John is in charge of the Fashion Show.

And what would a story with a horse-racing theme be without a tip? Here's one. Freedom Hall has about 14,000 seats and more people than that will likely want to catch this one, so get there early. Remember, post time is noon.

### THAT SOUND YOU'LL HEAR WILL HAVE A DRIVER BEHIND IT

So you thought woofers were going to the dogs and tweeters were for the birds, huh? You thought Yak Stacks were something you ordered in a restaurant and poured syrup on?

Ha! A lot you know. A lot your intrepid reporter knew, too, before talking to Wayne & Susan Osting, the 32nd National Square Dance Convention Services Chairman in charge of sound for the big bash June 23-25 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center.

Wade Driver, a national caller from Houston, Texas, is the man who will provide the sound for the 32nd National, including the Parade of States Sat. evening in Fairgrounds Stadium, which is just a few squares away from the 36-acre Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center Buildings.

This will be the first time Driver has taken on a job of this magnitude. But then, with some 40,000 square dancers expected to converge on our old Kentucky home in June, nobody else has ever taken on a job of this magnitude before, either.

"Wade is working very hard on this," Osting said. "He's done the sound for some big festivals in the past and I know he'll do an outstanding job here. You can quote me on that." Please notice that Osting was quoted.

To get an idea of how much work has gone into making sure the sound is right, that any mistakes you make dancing will be your fault and not the sound system's, consider these few facts:

The larger halls, those with 39,000 square feet, will be equipped with Hilton 300 turntables, remote-control microphones and three complete Yak Stacks. A Yak Stack, by the way, is a stand with two speakers.

Depending on the size, some of the smaller halfs will have Hilton 75 or 300 turntables, remotecontrol or wireless microphones, and from one-half a Yak Stack to one and a half Yak Stacks. Each

hall will be thoroughly tested for sound before you get here. That means for the trail-end dances on Wednesday, June 22, too.

None of the equipment will be for sale after the convention, Osting said.

The only places where Driver will not provide the sound is for the clinic rooms, including Education, and the Sew and Save area. Other than that, the only sound you hear will be Driver's.

Oh, you may hear an occasional "how-can-I-remake-the-thar-if-I-can't-make-a-thar-in-the-first-place?" but that'll be a different sound.

### SPECIAL MASSES SCHEDULED FOR 4:00 P.M. SATURDAY, JUNE 25

Three special Masses have been arranged to accommodate 32nd National Convention attendees. All three churches are near the Fairgrounds, so you should have ample time to return for the Parade of States. The churches are: Our Mother of Sorrows, Eastern Parkway at Preston Street, (502) 637-7442; St. Stephen Martyr, Hess Ln. and Pindell, (502) 635-5813; Guardian Angels, 6000 Preston Hwy., (502) 968-5421.

### YOU CAN'T TELL WHERE TO PROMENADE WITHOUT THE PROGRAM BOOK

You'll be able to tell who the hosts are when you get to the Convention. We'll be the folks in the green-and-blue outfits with our arms in a sling.

We've been telling you for about a year now how things are going to be bigger and better in Louisville in 1983, and here we are with the convention bearing down on us and we're still patting ourselves on the back. Does funny things to your arm, patting yourself on the back does. But, considering that we're working for well under the minimum wage — all the way under — we hope you can forgive us for that.

But here goes again.

The program book for this year's convention will be the biggest ever.

"It'll have about 150 pages," said Pat Griffith, who along with her husband Roger, is the program chairman. "It will include the biggest section ever on Education. There'll be a lot of color pictures and we'll have a pullout section of the daily programs that'll fit in your shirt pocket."

The program book contains dance schedules and other items of interest of Louisville and the surrounding area. The local restaurant operators, their heads not being filled with sand, have also deemed it wise to advertise in the program book. 'We've gotten over \$15,000 in advertising,' said Pat.

Each national convention normally prints 10,000 program books, which cost \$1.50 with advance registrations and \$2.00 at the door in accordance with National Executive Comm. guidelines.

But with 40,000 or more dancers expected for the 32nd National, will 10,000 program books be enough? "Maybe not," said Pat. Can more be printed if needed. "That's very, very possible," she said

To be on the safe side, though, it might not be a bad idea to get here early to get your program book. Besides, we're looking forward to shaking hands with you — if we can get our arms out of these blasted slings.

### THE FASHION SHOW OF THE 25th NEW ENGLAND CONVENTION

How delightful it was to be in Burlington, Vermont for our 25th Convention! Yes, we had a little rain for the Thursday night Anniversary Celebration, but it was a grand success with a full hall, Joe Casey and Charlie Baldwin Mastering the Ceremonies, our introduction to Grace, Charlie's bride, and introductions to the many past Convention Chairmen and past Yankee Clipper Award people. The evening was opened with a welcome to Vermont by the present Convention Chairmen, John and Cecyle Martin. Squares were called by Charlie Baldwin, Dick Leger, Joe Casey and Jirn Mayo and rounds were cued by Tom Riding, Tom Potts, Pat Channell and Marge Headen.

The sun came out on Friday for another first — a square dance parade through town with our S/D dignitaries riding in open convertibles, a fine high school band and square dancers parading and dancing. This was a great success in the eyes of all but the impatient motorists who should have been willing to "stop and smell the roses" as our Ed Ross Smith used to say.

Now, to our fashion show, 25 Years of Fashion. This opened with Chairmen Chub and Jackie Smith introducing narrator Anna Dixon, in her personally hand stitched silver silk dress, The bodice had a pleated front sewn with tiny sparkles that glittered in the stagelights. She, herself, narrated with a lively sparkle and ease which was a pleasure to listen to. After being introduced to Chub and Jackie's outfits which were the 25th Convention costumes (Illustration 1) done in hunter green and white, we saw two dresses of the late 50's, a handsome black squaw dress (2) and a black and white gingham (3) with red and white rick rack trim. I assume that both these dresses were shortened as the hemline came up, for probably the original length was mid-calf. In any case, they would look just as nice today for dancing as they did then. Next we were treated to the official outfits of past conventions. First, the bright green felt skirt and gold color puffed sleeved blouse (4) of the Pittsfield convention, '67-'68. This was used to advertise before the convention rather than to identify the committee at it. Next, the white dress with red and blue lace trim (5) each made in the style of the wearer's choice - of the Springfield convention '71-'72. The royal blue dress with bright vellow lace trim (6) was the official dress of the Providence conventions, '73-'74. The Portland conventions of '75-'76 gave us the great and memorable bicentennial with appropriate costumes in red, white and blue (7). Bright blue dresses with white and red trim, white petticoats and white shoes the first year, red petticoats, red cumberbands and red shoes the second year. The men's vests done in stars and stripes were spectacular! The '77-'78 Danvers conventions' costumes still had the taste of history in the colonial design of the dresses (8) done in navy blue and yellow dotted Swiss with lime green trim. The Manchester conventions of '79-'80 used the state color of lilacs in their lovely, simply designed lavender print dresses (9). Worcester in '81-'82 featured the colors of the city seal with red and white dresses (10) and red shirts and green badges. Finishing touches on the men were white ties, belts and shoes, and the design of the city seal on the belt buckles.

A break in the show at this point gave us "The Hometown Crowd" Barbershop Quartet, delightful and very entertaining, and costumed to please in bright blue trousers and vests, red and white striped shirts (white collars and cuffs) red gartered sleeves and big red bow ties.

Next, we saw home-sewn dresses of the present; all ladies being accompanied by their partners dressed in coordinated outfits. One very coordinated outfit was from Hawaii. Her dress was a hot pink print (11) with a triple flounced skirt, bell sleeves and a low scooped neck draped with a hot pink lei. He was dressed in white with a formal ruffled shirt, a hot pink cumberbund and wearing a lei to match hers. Very handsome outfits. (12) was nicely planned: her dress in a print of white with blue flowers, double ruffled at the bottom, the top ruffles caught up with little blue bows, and solid



blue ruffle showing underneath. This was actually a body suit and skirt, the bottom part of the suit being solid blue sizey pants trimmed with white lace. Each partner wore blue vests lined (reversible) in cranberry. Authentic and Simplicity patterns were used. Next was a very feminine coral and white print (13) with coral ruffling, his coral shirt was trimmed at yoke and pockets with the trim of the dress. Another Authentic pattern. Popular purple was featured in this dress with it's deep purple flounce and bodice sides (14), purple print bodice front and skirt. His solid color shirt with pockets and yoke of the print coordinated very well. Patterns used were McCall's and Simplicity.

Next was a very special occasion dress done all in pink satin (15). It was sleeveless with wide shoulder straps and a cover-up bolero jacket with long sleeves. He wore a pink shirt and cranberry trousers which matched her cranberry petticoat. My notes on this next dress (16) were incomplete and I'm not sure of the color - blue or lavender - but it was a nice combination of prints and featured a sweetheart neckline and tulip sleeves and bibbed front bodice that is so figure-flattering. (Will the designer of this dress let me know if I went too far wrong?) 17 was made from one of those wonderful Gunne Sax (Simplicity) patterns - this particular one, out of print. Done in shades of blue print in a sheer cotton, with the skirt featuring a coordinated flowered stripe, the sleeves sheer white. The dress had nice details of trim in white lace and white satin ribbon. His vest was quilted in the blue striped fabric and featured a white appliqued square on the back. His sheer navy blue tie was a nice touch. 18 was a pair of grandparent-grandchildren couples, all coordinated in country blue. Grandma wore a calico print peasant blouse and a blue chambray flounced skirt and granddaughter had a western blue shirt piped in white to match her granddad's and a skirt she, herself, designed of mixed prints, Her brother's shirt was a country blue Western also. A favorite Authentic pattern was the basis of this pale orange polyester cape-collared dress (19). Her partner's pale orange shirt was made from a Kwik-Sew pattern and featured an interesting arrow point yoke. 20 was a deep plum-colored dress with an over-skirt of a sheer print fabric. White ruffled trim was featured on the over-skirt, puffed sleeves and on the neck which was a deep V in the back. 21 was a polyester print in rust, beige and apricot. It featured long full sleeves, a high neck and a double circle skirt. Lace was accented at the waist and throat. The yoke of her partner's shirt and tie were made of matching fabric. 22 was a neat sailor outfit with a navy circle skirt and white top with the typical navy collar in white, banded in navy braid with red stars on the back corners. The simple set in sleeves were also banded in the braid. The white rope tie belt was a fine touch. His white shirt and navy trousers complimented the dress perfectly. This right yellow blouse and rust skirt with yellow maple leaf appliques (23) made a striking color combination. A rust calico print banded the full sleeves of her peasant blouse, and the voke and pocket flaps of his purchased yellow shirt. An unusual and effective combination of colors. 24 was a very simple and flattering sleeveless dress with a flared skirt. Done in a polyester print of white with blue flowers, it had a simple blue ribbon sash. His powder blue shirt was a fine coordinate for the dress. The simple black dress (25) with it's long full sleeves and V neck was trimmed around the neck and wrists with ruffley white lace which was repeated at the hemline by a flounce of wide lace. Finally, we have here an example of the classic square dance style (26) - round neck, puffed sleeves, flounced skirt. Using the popular flowered print in lavender with it's coordinated flowered stripe, it makes a fine dress, but this one's something special was a sweater knitted to match!

Before the final scene, I want to mention the two couples of cloggers who entertained us during the show. Dressed in crisp white blouses and red circle skirts, the men's shirts white with red yokes and red ties, and directed by the Hansons, they danced up a storm for us with great timing and spirit.

The final scene of the show was the square of the future. Before the curtains opened, many pictures went through our heads. What kinds of costumes? How far-out would they be? Would they dance strange calls that we had never heard of? Then the curtains opened! The scene was a square of little children all dressed for square dancing. What a wonderful surprise! They danced a little square for us and the show was over. What a great finish.

## Tony Marshall

COMING TO GERMAN ALPS FEST

Headline entertainment from Germany in the name of singer Tony Marshall comes to the 11th annual German Alps Festival and Goebelfest at Hunter Mountain high in New York's northern Catskill region. The festival runs July 14 to 31. (Mondays closed.)

Another music highlight will be the return of the 26-piece Musikverein Dettingen E.V. brass band from Germany's Black Forest. Under the direction of Anton Shumacher, the band, a hit last year, will be performing all 16 days.

Marshall, the "Mister Sunshine" recording star and versatile performer in Germany, brings his show to the festival July 15-31. Marshall, himself, entertains July 16 to 20, breaks for a TV special in Germany, and then returns for July 27 to 31 performances which are slated afternoons and evenings.

Area oompah bands are also scheduled to insure continuous entertainment in the Great Tent which will be larger than a football field. New this year will be reserved seating areas for organizations and companies.

Zither player Toni Noichl and accordinist Helga Beckman team up for delightful restaurant tent entertainment, while the Rhinelanders of Pennsylvania roam daily. Individual musicians are also here and there helping to create the feeling that music is everywhere.

The Goebelfest attracts collectors from every state of the union with its huge array of M. I. Hummel and other Goebel figurines and products from Germany, Goebel and Hummel artists including steinmakers will be on hand to demonstrate their crafts. A live Hummel figurine lookalike contest is set for July 30.

Beer steins including antiques are another important feature. Members of chapters of the New York State Stein Collector's International will be gathering at the festival July 30.

The German Alps Festival, a village of tents surrounding the spacious Hunter Mountain Ski Bowl lodge, has many other entertainment ingredients that appeal to all ages, ranging from puppets to Clydesdale horses, to falconry demonstrations. One of the new entertainers will be a magician, Timothy Wenk.

The festival touches all the senses. Mixed with the sound of music and laughter, is the aroma of grilled chicken, wursts and other delights. Dinkelacker beer from Stuttgart leads off a list of foreign and domestic beers — in fact there are over 140 brands in the International Beer Exposition where beer tasting periods are held also.

An annual parade complete with drum and bugle units, brass bands, hitches of horses, marching groups and festival participants open the festival at noon, July 14.

The German Alps Festival, the largest of its kind in the United States, is one of six events this summer at Hunter Mountain. The new Italian Festival leads off the season July 8, 9, 10. The Hunter Country Music Festival, with Loretta Lynn, Roy Clark, Don Williams, Jerry Reed, follows August 4 to 7. The National Polka Festival, with Bobby Vinton every day, is next, August 12, 13, 14. World Reowned Chieftains add musical glitter to the International Celtic Festival, August 19 to 21. And the 2nd annual Mountain Eagle Indian Festival ends the 2 month summer season, Sept. 3 to 5.

Folders listing all events or copies of the "Summer Festival Preview" tabloid newspaper, along with a listing of area housing and campgrounds, can be had free from Exposition Planners Ltd., Bridge St., Hunter, NY 12442. 518-263-3800. A Goebelfest artist schedule can be had also. Special bus group rates are available.

Hunter is located on Route 23A, a half hour off the New York Thruway, exits 19 or 20 from the south, 21 from the north. Driving time from Albany is approximately an hour; from New York City, 2½ hours; from Boston 4 hours; from Washington, D.C. 6 hours. Daily bus service to and from Hunter is provided by Adirondack Trailways.

## COMMENT

I have just returned home from the 1983 New England Convention in Burlington, Vt. The folks in the North Country surely made us welcome. The facilities were good and so was the planning. We had a great time and we're looking forward to next year eagerly. The 25th Anniversary Celebration was a great success on Thursday night also. More people came than anyone expected and it was fun to chat with so many of those who have participated in the Convention over the past quarter century. Joe & Phyllis Casey did a super job of organizing the celebration and collecting memorabilia from the whole period for the display they had set up.

Conventions give me the opportunity to see more callers calling to real dancers (as distinct from other callers at callers' schools) than I can at any other time. As you know, I am concerned about where square dancing is headed and when I see something I don't understand I wonder about it. I saw something I didn't understand and I am going to wonder about it publicly. There were several times during the Convention when I saw callers doing what I would have to call bad calling. They were using workshop timing with frequent, long hesitations while they cajoled the dancers (some of them.) into place in very complex dance sequences. A large part of the floor was stopped and never did get through the figures. In short, the kind of calling that many dancers complain to me about. This fact doesn't surprise me. There are many inexperienced callers at Conventions and you might expect that they would not all be great. One thing that did surprise me is that these were often callers that I know to be popular who are booked repeatedly to call for return visits to clubs. Another thing that surprised me was that here at the Convention, with other halls and callers readily available, most of the dancers came back to dance to these callers in their second tip. It's enough to make a fella quit trying to do a good job. Certainly the applause these callers received for failing to get the floor through the figures they were calling would give them no clue that they were less appreciated than the callers who did call material the dancers could handle.

I don't understand why dancers would want to stand around watching a few squares make it through the figure after their own square broke down. Yet the applause awarded to this performance was often greater than that for the caller who got the whole floor (or at least most of it) through figures that were suited to the skill and experience of the majority of the dancers. (Note: I'm not talking about calls outside the Callerlab Program list for the hall — I saw no violations of that sort.) I'm talking about using the listed calls in ways that made them particularly difficult to accomplish. Have I been getting the wrong message all these years? Do you really like to break down in the hope that someday your square will be the one that makes it while others stand around and watch you? When the material is tough, the technique callers may use to get some of the people through is "workshop timing." It's a stop-and-go style of dancing that gives extra thinking time betwee calls. This technique lets a caller use more complicated choreographic puzzles than the group could dance through smoothly. Better callers can halance ability and complexity so the hesitations are only slight but even they pay a price in smoothness for a more complicated puzzle.

I work hard to find interesting dance routines that are still within the ability of most dancers. I expect that almost everyone at a dance will make it successfully through almost everything I call. This seems to be well-received and I'm not complaining about the size of the crowds when I call. I'm just having trouble understanding what I observed this weekend. I also have one other trouble with my observation. I teach many callers. What should I tell them? Is it OK to clobber the floor and leave gross timing gaps while they try to reach the maximum choreographic complexity? Or should they keep trying to offer smooth, rhythmic dancing in the hope that most dancers will appreciate. Unfortunately, I got the impression this weekend that for many dancers the fact that the whole floor got through the figure smoothly means they weren't being challenged and next time they'll look for someone who can stop the floor. Ed Gilmore said it, "Anyone can stop the floor, it takes a caller to keep them dancing."

## CHALLENGE RAMBLINGS

Information about what happened at Callerlab can be found in the May Shop Talk column. Basically, we eliminated the challenge quarterly selections list. It will be replaced with a newsletter which will indicate which new calls are currently being used in the challenge program.

At the very end of Callerlab, a caller got up and said, "Be it resolved that all shoulder passing shall be right shoulders in all cases except for the call Cross Trail Thru". Actually, I don't remember what he said but it was something like that. The chair asked for any discussion. John Sybalsky almost said something but thought better of it. I wasn't sure what I thought. The only discussion amended it to be for a one year trial basis. There being no further discussion a vote was taken. It passed, with only a handful of callers voting against it.

It turns out that the vote was illegal because when the Mainstream definitions were voted in, a method of changing them was established. This method made changing the definitions very hard because so much time and effort had gone into their creation. The vote to change the shoulder passing rule was interpreted to be a change to the Mainstream definitions and must follow the proper procedure (which it didn't). Therefore, the vote to change the shoulder passing rule was ruled invalid and shoulder passing remains the same as it has been. However, I am sure that this issue is going to appear next year.

That fact that it was illegal and will have to appear next year is good. In general, things that are voted on at Callerlab are discussed for two days in smaller meetings before being voted on in a general meeting. Often these issues (e.g. should Plus 1 and 2 be combined?) are discussed for the whole year in each members' area. It does not seem wise to vote on something as important as shoulder passing without proper thought and discussion.

So, now is the time to think and discuss. I will tell you my thoughts and I hope that you tell me yours.

When I started dancing (1974), I was taught to pass right shoulders when two dancers were about to collide and were facing in opposite directions. However, on cross movements, one passed left shoulders. These cross movements didn't occur very often at Mainstream. The calls Cross Run, Cross Fold, Crosstrail Thru, and Cross Cloverleaf come to mind, but they aren't used very often, and the cases in which the crossing rule must be used occur less often. At the Advanced and Challenge programs, the crossing rule is more important because there are more places where it applies, both because of more crossing calls like Cross Over Circulate, Cross Cast Back, Cross Zoom, etc., and because there are more calls that contain crossing movements as part of their action like Cross The K, Cross Breed Thru, Pass The Axle, etc.

I have always made a big point of teaching my dancers to pass left shoulders on cross movements because John Sybalsky always made a big point of it. Even though is was just a small technical point that 99% of the time didn't make any difference in making the sequence work, we still felt better since we did things the *right* way and most other dancers didn't know or care enough to. In the sense that the sequence usually works no matter which shoulder one passes, the crossing rule is like a styling hint; you don't have to do it this way, but it works better and looks nicer when everyone does.

So, John and I raised a group of dancers who passed left shoulders on cross moves even though most dancers we encountered didn't know or care enough to do it. After a while, we may have convinced some other dancers in other areas to obey the crossing rule. This brings us up to date. Currently some people pass right, and some pass left shoulders on cross moves. It would be better if everyone did it one way or the other. There is no absolute right or wrong since this is a folk activity. The left shoulder rule has always caused a lot of problems and has never been very well followed. Challenge dancing has enough rules and details to remember that life would be easier without the left shoulder rule. Most callers' material would still work of we changed to a right shoulder only rule. In the long run (i.e. 5 years from now), I think it would be better for all involved if we change over to a right shoulder only rule. However, we would have to decide what to do about Crosstrail Thru and the trailers part of Cross Over Circulate. I hope that those calls would remain such that the Belle crosses in front of the Beau.

What do you think about all of this? Do you currently pass left shoulders on cross movements? Would you be willing to change?

## YANKEE CLIPPER AWARD

Presentations made at the Square Dance Convention in Burlington, Vermont.

### **ED & CORA BUTLER**

Their willingness to work was an inspiration to all in the Square and Round Dance World. Ed and Cora were always ready to serve on any committee for the good of the movement.

They were charter members of the Town Travelers Square Dance Club and members of the 4-H Square Dance Club.

Ed was past President of the North of Boston Square Dance Callers Association, past Chairman of NECCA and served as Caller Registration Chairman for the 1977 & 1978 New England Convention.

Ed was an active dancer and caller and well-known throughout New England for his dedication to the idea of smooth dencing and for his involvement in NECCA, CO-OP and the Square Dance Foundation of New England.

In private life he was active in the Lowell Rotary Club and was a volunteer for 20 years in the Boy Scouts of America. He joined professional scouting in 1941, serving in Rutland, Vt. and Waterbury, Ct., prior to becoming Chief Executive of the Greater Lowell Council, a position he held until his retirement in 1968. During that time he initiated the formation of a special troop for retarded boys. He also was a member of the Lowell Conservation Commission and a member of the Retarded Adult Rehabilitation Association of Greater Lowell.

Ed was well-known and respected for his ability to organize, plan, run meetings and get things done. Ed's Wit, Wisdom and Sincerity and Cora's Loyalty and Devotion make them worthy of the Yankee Clipper Award.

#### DICK & CAROL STEELE

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Over 32 years of teaching people to square dance, calls for a love and dedication to the activity which is characteristic of Dick and Carol.

Dick was introduced to square dancing in 1946 and started calling one-night stands to live music in 1948. The acquisition of a public address system opened up a whole new dimension in calling and he travelled all over New England regularly and into New York and Canada, promoting square dancing wherever he went.

In 1951, Dick and Carol started a beginners class in Lexington which expanded to four groups at different levels and which in 1961 organized as the Minutemen Squares.

During this time, Dick was spearheading the square dance movement on the North Shore. He has served as president of the Old Colony Callers Association and has been a member of EDSARDA and charter member of the New England S/D Foundation, the North of Boston Callers Assoc. and the New England Folk Festival Association.

When the EDSARDA FESTIVAL was organized 25 years ago, Dick was on the Callers Staff and called at a number of subsequent Festivals.

During the 35 years of calling, he has graduated untold thousands to the joys and fellowship of square dancing. After retiring in 1973 he also retired from travelling long distances and now specializes in teaching beginners, five nights a week for five different clubs.

He was also willing to donate his time to benefit dances and has always taught easy rounds and mixers to his beginners and promoted rounds as he believes they are a requirement for a successful club.

In private life he served as a Lieutenant in Naval Aviation during the war and is a licensed pilot. As a champion swimmer in college, he was captain of the swim team. He served for many years as physical education teacher in Quincy and introduced his students to square dancing. His hobbies are woodworking and carving and he keeps fit by walking three miles a day and exercising on a regular basis.

"Besides good exercise and mental challenge — the most rewarding aspects of square dancing are the friendships made," says Dick; and he and Carol "... are proud to have been a part of this great activity and to have seen the growth over the whole United States, as Square Dancing has become the National Dance of the Country."

Dick and Carol well deserve the Yankee Clipper Award.







In Ivor's honor I've written and called the following contra. (He danced it near Albany.) It's called:

Formation: Alternate duple Music: Any 32-bar tune. (I have only used jigs, so far.)

- Cu i split Cu 2, (Who come Al together and face up) and separate to stand on the end of a four-in-line facing up. 14 harsl All fwd & back and turn alone to face down in a line-of-4. 14 bars]
- All fwd & back (4 bars), lead down A2 2 bars]; Wheel half as couples [2 bars and face corner. (The one you were holding hands with during the wheel around.)[2 bars]
- B1 Holding both hands with corner, sashay up [2 bars] and balance with corner. [2 bars] Swing corner and end facing across the set. [4 bars]
- Half Promenade [4 bars]; and Half Right & Left. |4 bars

The next weekend we flew to Maryland. The event we were headed for was the first Spring Chesapeake Dance Weekend at Camp Letts just outside of Annapolis. The program included squares, contras, Canadian step dancing, clogging, live music, 19th C. ballroom and leader's workshops.

With Spring here at last, so many of us are trying to take off a few pounds, so we can get back into our summer clothes. It is not an easy task. I hope one of these recipes will help you.

I have found that putting a piece of white fish in a pyrex dish (sprayed with pam) and

adding a good sprinkle of *lemon pepper* to the fish makes a real tasty dish. I cook it about 5 min. in the microwave oven. It may also be baked or broiled. The secret is the lemon pepper. We all know fish is a dieter's best friend.

I also have found that the frozen chunks of melon serve as a good fruit in the middle of the day. I even like it right from the freezer. It is like a frozen fruit popsicle.

A real nice and easy recipe for the whole family is a chicken dish. It is called:

### QUICK AND EASY LO-CAL CHICKEN

% cup lemon juice
1 cup orange juice
artificial sweetner — to taste
1 tablespoon orange rind grated
1 teaspoon marjoram
1½ pounds cooked chicken
(boned and sliced)
1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Combine juices and sweetener. Add orange rind and marjoram and cook over low heat for 5 minutes stirring constantly. Place chicken in casserole. Spoon sauce over chicken. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes.

Garnish with parsley when ready to serve.

## PARADE OF STATES TO BE HELD IN THE COOL, COOL EVENING

Oh, when the states, Oh when the states, Oh, when the states go marching in, I You'll want to be in that lineup, I When the states go marching in.

Okay, so they probably won't play"When the Saints Go Marching In" for the Parade of States at the 32nd National Square Dance Convention; it still will be the gala event it always has been. And it looks as though it's going to be a biggie.

Just how big a biggie, you ask? This big a biggie:

The traditional Parade of States will be held in Fairgrounds Stadium, a 37,000-seat arena that is home to the University of Louisville football team and the Louisville Redbirds' of the professional American Association. The Redbirds drew a minor-league baseball record of 868,418 for their home games in 1982.

We aren't expecting quite that many folks for the parade, but we're expecting a lot of them to take part when the parade begins at 7 p.m. EDT. The lineup will begin forming at 6:15 p.m. on the west side of the stadium, which is next door to the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center.

In case of rain = Heaven forbid! = the Parade of States will be held in Freedom Hall. The dancers are to form on the field at the stadium and square up for what could easily be the biggest square dance ever. If it rains the dancers will simply file through Freedom Hall and then come back and be seated. Although Freedom Hall has 39,000 square feet of floor space (and more than 14,000 seats), it won't be big enough to hold all the dancers expected to take part in the Parade of States.

Dancers from Kentucky, the hosts for the 1983 National, will lead off the parade. They will be followed by Maryland (Baltimore, 1984), Alabama (Birmingham, 1985) and Indiana (Indianapolis, 1986). Then will come the dancers from foreign countries, each country filing in in alphabetical order, and then the other 46 states, from Alaska to Wyoming. A large sign will identify each contingent.

As each group is introduced to the crowd, their total number of dancers registered for the 32nd National will be announced.

There will also be grand marches in the larger halfs on Thursday and Friday to open the evening program each night. Plans now are for grand marches at 6:30 in Broadbent Arena and at 7 p.m. in Freedom Half.

During the program following the Parade of States, before we get to the final evening of square dancing, the announcement will be made of the site for the 1987 convention.

You have your marching orders now, so bring your dancing shoes. Can you march in dancing shoes? . . . Can you dance in marching shoes? . . .

In March we had the pleasure of attending the Ct. S/D Festival with Ray & Carole Aubut, editors of the New England Caller Magazine. We were provided space for a booth for the magazine and for the S/D Foundation of New England. We were visited by many of our Ct. friends and had the opportunity to become acquainted with many others. The Festival was well-attended and afforded us an opportunity of exposure to the people and activities in that area.

The month of April is traditionally New England Convention time as square dancers from all over join together in a fun-filled weekend. The event takes place annually on the third weekend of April. It is conducted and run totally by square dance volunteers from a given area. Every two years it will move to a new location somewhere in New England. This mammoth undertaking, which makes it the second largest such event in the country, will draw upwards to 10,000 dancers. The program includes dancing in many halls throughout the city featuring hundreds of callers and cuers. with continuous bus transportation between halls. Dancing levels vary, including rounds, halls for teens and senior citizens, and even live music. This year's convention was Apr. 21-23 in Burlington, Vt. This was the 25th year of such an event and to commemorate the occasion, a special dance celebration was held Thursday evening Apr. 21st with 1200 people attending and then a parade on Friday afternoon.

We were at the Convention manning the Foundation booth, which was located in the exhibitor's area, and enjoyed having so many friends drop by to visit with us. We were pleased to be able to explain what membership in the Foundation means to a Square Dancer. They saw for themselves photos of Kramers Hayloft and how it will eventually serve as the Foundation headquarters. We also had dancers sign their state's petition to enable us to attempt to get all New England states to declare "Square Dance Week" in September.

For those who are new to square dance and have never attended a Square Dance convention, we hope you had a real treat. The enjoyment of being with so many friends who share a common interest will carry with it memories that can linger for a lifetime.

A couple of special events coming up in May are the 25th Anniversary Dance of the Border City Squares of Nashua. The theme is, "Dance is Pretty with Border City" and will be held Sat. May 14th, 8:00 PM at the Elm St. Jr. High in Nashua, while the following day, Sun. May 15th, takes us to the Foundation Benefit Dance sponsored by the Seacoast Region S/D Assoc. from 1 to 5 PM at the New Hampshire Hall, Main St., Durham, N.H. featuring many callers and cuers. It is always interesting to take in a dance at this time of year, as our ranks swell with new graduate members presenting an opportunity to widen our circle of friends.

## LEE !!!

An energetic, self-assured man strides to the stage, picks up the mike, puts the needle on the record — always at the exact appointed time — as a crowded floor of square dancers waits with expectancy. That man is Lee Kopman, who needs no introduction in the Advanced and Challenge square dancing community across the United States, Canada, Europe, and Japan. For years his name has been synonymous with excellence among all levels of dancing.

Contrary to general belief, Lee is not a native New Yorker, although he has lived there most of his life. He was born in Philadelphia, moved to New York at an early age, and has considered it "home" for many years. He graduated from Forest Hills High School, received a BS from Adelphi University with a Physical Education major, and an MS from Hofstra University. He was very

actively involved in all aspects of college life — top man on campus! He played varsity lacrosse, was captain (and No. 1 man) of the squash team, and was president of his class three of his four years at Adelphi. It was there (in his squash shorts) that he attracted the attention of a young student named Lilith Hye, who decided on the spot to take squash in hopes of getting to know this exuberant young man just a little bit better. Others, too, were vying for his attention but she finally won out over the competition (especially the girl in the Spanish class!), and after a whirlwind three-weeks' courtship, they became engaged. Lilith's enthusiasm and support have been a great asset to Lee, not only in his personal life, but in all aspects of his work. She truly is his No. 1 fan!

One of the required courses in his PE studies was a class in square and folk dancing (which at that time was Eastern dancing) using very simple steps like Red River Valley. duck for the oyster, etc. He really enjoyed that course by a teacher who was also a professional caller. When Lee was teaching after college graduation, he started to look for ways to supplement his teacher's salary, which was very low at that time. So back he went to his college teacher, talked with him, attended his dances, watched him work, and occasionally was allowed to call a tip. The very beginning of Lee's career was in his own classroom. He was teaching his kids in school, and they would do assembly programs and demonstrations. Someone saw him at one of these programs and asked if he called professionally to which he replied, "Yes, I do call professionally" (naughty, naughty, BIG fibber!). So off he went to his very first job, scared silly - a nervous wreck - but once on stage he felt as though he had been there forever. It was absolutely terrific, and from that night one thing led to another. He discovered a caller's association on Long Island and joined it. At the Association he was introduced to "western" dancing, Although it was very exciting to him, Lilith did not initially share his interest and enthusiasm. They went to a couple of dances and felt that they were the dumbest dancers there - never took lessons, but just kept going. They both are natural dancers, however, and were able to learn on the floor. At this point Lilith was not remotely enthused with any aspect of square dancing, but Lee was devoting himself to it 110%, at times much to her chagrin,

In the meantime he met a caller on Long Island, one of the early Challenge callers in New York, Mr. Paul Hunt. He was a respected caller with a very select following, and Lee became very close to him, both professionally and personally. This man may be considered his mentor and was probably the most influential person in the launching of his high-level calling career. Lee was the only caller in the area who liked that kind of dancing. After working at night until 10:00 PM, Lee would hurry to Paul Hunt's dances to listen and observe. He took a special interest in Lee and it was a reciprocal relationship – they had almost a father/son relationship. His death was a personal loss to Lee, but ironically was a turning point in his career. Every group that Paul Hunt had called for booked Lee, who immediately went from calling one night a week to five nights a week. As Lee states, "When you call that often, you've just gotta get better!" From that point Lee began to

earnestly apply himself to challenge calling - the type of dancing he really liked. He did not completely understand all the concepts, but kept plugging away. There really were no short cuts, just constant work, trial and error, and perseverance. As his skills progressed with sight calling and a better knowledge of the square dance "language" he began calling

a higher level and had an occasional out-of-town booking.

He started taping his dances to better understand his own shortcomings and abilities, and these tapes began to show up here and there around the country. The Kopmans began traveling at their own expense just to get exposure to the dancers and dancing. His first real booking was for a large crowd (125 squares) near Erie, Pennsylvania. He had never seen so many square dancers in his life — he was petrified! He felt that his calling was acceptable but not great, but one has to start someplace. Then he was booked for the WASCA Festival in Washington, D.C. This was the supreme opportunity, and both he and Lilith ate, drank, and slept WASCA Festival for nearly a year. His first assignment for the festival was calling a morning dance in the Advanced hall. Many of the Washington dancers had been dancing to his tapes but had never danced to him live. Lee was so nervous and was shaking so hard he could not function. Sam Mitchell, who preceded him, had to put the needle on the record for him. After that tip there was a standing ovation - that was the turning point in the calling career of Mr. Lee Kopman! What a totally uplifting experience!

From there he went from one festival to another. Experience led him to temper his calling and he began to develop a more professional approach to the business of square dancing. Lee is a skilled teacher. He is able to get across instructions quickly, concisely, and clearly, which is indeed a gift. He handles large crowds well. At the Kansas City National Convention in 1975 he was dealing with five to six hundred squares, and from there he really began to get national exposure. This was before challenge levels were established, and eventually he was requested to do an Introduction to Advanced Level teaching session, which was mobbed. At one of his early WASCA festivals to a jammed floor of dancers, Lee taught, "Plan Ahead", which is not a simple call, but by the end of the hour the entire floor was dancing it. What an ovation he got after that session - the

rafters shook! He felt that to be one of his proudest moments.

There have been many "proud moments" in Lee's career. Probably the biggest highlight was the nationally televised Donahue show. This gave instant coverage and recognition of square dancing to countless viewers all over the country. With his professionalism and ability, Lee Kopman, during that one hour did more to promote the interest of square dancing than any other one event ever.

Also George Veschy, one of the authors of "Kramer vs. Kramer" did a writeup in the New York Times - another boost to the activity. Lee also is included in Time-Life "Leisure-Time Series" which includes beautiful color pictures illustrating various basic

steps.

Amusing stories? Not too long ago Lee and Lilith were traveling in Massachusetts with the CB on, and coming through was "This is the square dancer, signing off!" Lee broadcast, "This is Lee Kopman here. Who is this, and who do you dance to?!" The

reply, "Charlie Osgood - and who do you dance to?!"

The Kopman family consists also of Steve, a recognized caller in his own right, and his wife, Deborah, now living in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. The Kopman daughter, Phyllis, works for a television news station, satellite channel SNC. Unfortunately, square dancing cannot really be a part of her life now, although she still enjoys it.

Lilith stays busy doing a variety of things. She is a substitute teacher (but works every day), and for five weeks each year directs the school play. She is great with young people! This time block is her very own, during which she does not concern herself with the square dance world. The stage is her great love, her very favorite thing. Since Lee is certainly a stage personality, she accepts her role as caller's wife with grace and finesse!

Lee Kopman never takes square dancing for granted. He approaches it with a total professionalism and dedication. Over the years, despite two full-time jobs, he has tried never to short-change one career for the other. It is totally unacceptable to him not to

give 100% to either endeavor. In square dancing if he does not do a good job, the dancers know it, and it reflects in the attendance and enjoyment. He spends hours of preparation for each dance. Material cannot be repeated - it has to be brand new. Hours and hours of writing go into each dance. For years he has followed a rigid and at times nerve-wracking schedule: up at 6:30 AM each day to work on dance material before reporting to school at 9:15 AM, then out every week night to call a dance, with bookings for at least 42 weekends each year, which means rushing home from school each Friday to catch a plane, and home again Sunday to start the same schedule over on Monday. There was also the responsibility of school which involved not only his teaching, but many extra-curricular activities as well. The schedule had begun to get so overwhelming that he has now taken a year's leave of absence to relax and do a bit of reevaluation. There is no question but what life is more relaxed since he stopped teaching. He also wanted to slow down before a health problem might give a signal to curtail his career. With responsibility of raising both his children behind him, he feels that he is performing and writing better under considerably less pressure. Lee tries to stay at least a month ahead in writing for his dances. Even on weekends while away, he is writing, not for that dance, but for dances down the line. Dancers are improving so much each year that a tip which once required 10 to 15 cards now requires 20 or 25. At one time 35 pages of material would cover a C-4 dance, now 60 pages are required. It takes hours of work and must be checked, C-4 dancers would love to have a full-time floor at every dance, but it is not possible considering the amount of caller work involved. If a good reputation has been established, a certain degree of proficiency and excellence is expected of the caller, and he must not let the dancers down. Lee Kopman has rightly earned his reputation as a caller of proficiency and competence. He is an astute spokesman and advocate not only of the Advanced and Challenge levels of dancing, but of all levels of dancing. He is a prolific and creative writer of calls, evidenced by his authorship of more than 200 calls (see page 10), many of which are household words to dancers of all levels, and most of which form the backbone of higher-level dancing. The challenge movement would not have reached its present level if the development of calls had not kept pace with both the ability of dancers and the ingenuity of callers.

Despite his interest and advocacy of the Challenge movement, Lee feels that the future of square dancing as a whole lies not in the Challenge sector but at the Mainstream level. In the past few years, so much has been done by dancers to promote their individual interests in climbing the ladder through each Advanced and Challenge level that the Mainstream levels have been sorely neglected. Lee is once again calling a Mainstream club. although with his current commitments he is presently not in a position to teach at that level. Few people have the time or dedication to promote levels lower than what they dance. Lee therefore feels strongly that this responsibility lies with callers of all levels to serve the Mainstream community. These dancers, after all, undergird all the other levels and must be given serious consideration, for they are truly the future of square dancing. With the numbers of dancers shifting upward in levels, eventually the foundation will sag if not fully nurtured. Mainstream dancers normally do not travel extensively and generally are not as dedicated as the high-frequency dancers. Their commitment to dancing may be a little different, but everyone is wanted and needed. If Beginning and Mainstream dancers are not supported, whatever their commitment, the numbers at all subsequent levels will eventually go down. That's the bottom line!

Now — what about Lee's retirement. Rumors continue to buzz. Lee states very emphatically that New York is home — he loves it, and that's where he plans to stay. The Kopmans feel that they have the most exciting life of anyone they know in the whole world. They really enjoy many of the places they travel, but they plan always to come back home. Their trip to England last year was great — to Japan this year was equally terrific. However, his byword is "I New York" — and New York loves Lee! He loves his work and it shows. As long as this versatile, energetic, punctual man can stride across a packed floor, pick up his mike, and look over a group of expectant dancers who regard him with respect and affection, Lee Kopman will reign the undisputed "King of Challenge"!

In March I reprinted a letter that I had written ten years before on the topic of banner raids. I also stated that very few people had told me that they had read the letter. This time, however, a relatively large number of people have commented. One of those respondents, a friend and a person whom I respect for his concern for the square dance activity, responded by means of a letter to the Caller office that appeared in the May Reader's Forum. Joe's letter made me aware that perhaps my writing style hid the real points that I was trying to make and just in case others also misinterpreted what I wrote as Joe did, I feel compelled to make a few clarifying comments.

First of all, the term "stuffed jackass" referred to a banner, or more specifically, a travelling trophy frequently in the form of a stuffed animal as was more prevalent at the time the original letter was written. It in no way was intended to mean banner raiders, dancers or callers.

It is a fact though, that the size of the average dance and the size of the average class is down from what it was ten years ago. To my way of thinking, this is a problem, and my letter asked you, the readers, to consider whether banner raiding may be contributing to this problem. It is very clear that, in the short run, banner raids are a help, but consider the possibility of the long run. How many people who are no longer dancing have had poorly-run banner raiding programs contribute to their reasons for quitting? The variety, the camaraderie, and the friendships built up by visiting other clubs are all very, very important, but you will find that just as much of this is gained when visiting even if a banner is not awarded. Since this current controversy started, I have heard banner chairmen at three different clubs say words to the effect that since there only six couples signed up for the raid, they would be forced to cancel the trip. Would it not have been much better to say. "We have six couples visiting the so-and-so club. We expect it will be a real good dance. If at least

two more couples will come along with us, we could also get a banner when we are there." I have also seen, in the last month, seven couples from one club travel an hour and a half to a dance, and not be recognized with local clubs that brought eight, at the banner presentations. Think of the good interclub relations that could have been gained.

I am very much aware that some banner chairmen try very hard to arrange banner stealing trips to dances that they would want to go to anyway. This is an excellent criteria because those coming along with them will probably have good dancing experiences, the kind of experience that will help keep them in dancing. These same banner chairmen, however, have much less control over the quality of the dances where they must go to retrieve banners, and it is these dances that I worry about. Some dancers will gladly go along, even to a poor dance, because they like to play the game, but some won't. Should we chase these dancers, who have less time and are therefore more selective, away from square dancing completely?

Several dancers have told me, in the last few weeks, that they have had friends drop out of square dancing because these friends wanted to dance only once every week or two, and they would rather give it up completely than fight the peer pressure of those trying to get them on banner raids.

I'm afraid I must also take exception to Joe's comments that clubs are no concern of callers. We do care and we must care and I can't help but think that Joe is in the minority with that stand.

Again, in summary, I would like you to think about whether we wouldn't all be better off if seven couples visited a good dance than if eight couples were forced into visiting a poor one.


While on the subject of my writing being misunderstood, I received many comments about my article the following month, also (April issue). Some were pro and some were con; some were from dancers and some were from prominent callers and cuers; a few even realized that is was an APRIL FOOL'S article! Which group were you in? April 1984 is only ten months away! How obvious will I have to be?

Let us now take a closer look at the current quarterly selection for the plus program. Track and (anything). Starting from a column (see fig. 1) the lead two dancers in each column (couples 2 and 4 in fig. 1) move single file around the other column, in an action

similar to the one they would do in a Track Two. At the same time the trailing two couples (1 and 3 in fig. 1) also move forward, but stop after one column circulate, as shown in fig. 2.



The same people, the original trailers, in their box of 4, take the next command, i.e. do the (anything). For instance, if the (anything) were Walk and Dodge, the caller would call Track and Walk and Dodge. The trailing dancers would do their circulate (fig. 2) and then continue into a Walk and Dodge to finish the call as shown in fig. 3.

Be careful, when dancing the (anything) part to establish (at least mentally) where the circulate ends before starting the next part. Calls like Track & Trade or Track and Hinge give dancers very little trouble because the next call is done with the person they meet. Calls like Track & Scoot Back, where they must immediately move on to a new person, frequently cause more problems. Callerlab suggests the following (anythings): Trade, Cast off ¾, Box Circulate, Scoot Back, Single Hinge, Walk & Dodge, Partner Tag, U-Turn Back, Follow Your Neighbor, and Follow Your Neighbor and Spread.

## WESTERN MASS S/D ORGANIZATION A HISTORY LESSON

There has been much accomplished during the past three years, with the work and cooperation of WMSARDA, SACA, WNERDTA and the CO-OP Committee. To the newly graduated, these abbreviations mean little... and should be explained.

### WMSARDA

The Western Mass. Sq. & R/D Assoc.— Organized 27 years ago to prevent duplication of callers, and to publish a monthly calendar. It is the dancer organization that maintains standards which clubs follow in respect to by-laws, lessons, and other coordinated projects.

#### SACA

The Springfield Area Callers Assoc., formed in 1959, to resolve problems concerning 'style of movement' in square dancing. The Assoc. Is dedicated to maintaining quality in the calling profession, and provide leadership in the movement. It sets standards to what will be taught at lessons. SACA co-sponsors the Fall Festival with WMSARDA, which provides financial support to continue with projects.

#### WNERDTA

Western New England R/D Teachers Assoc. It is the association that Cuers belong to. They meet to discuss and maintain standards in the round dance figures, and the screening of new dances, and what will be taught and danced.

### CO-OP

Refers to the Western Mass. Co-op Committee. As the name suggests, it includes Teens, Singletons and Senior Citizens. Co-op, with the approval of its delegates from the other bodies, has run the "Learn to Square Dance" campaign each year. Co-op sponsored the D.S.A. Awards this year, as we did in 1980 and 1982. The Summer Dances at Stanley Park are due to our desire to keep dancing going all year round.

Co-op participates in the Festival of Clowns each June, and the Kielbasa Festival in Sept., with a booth to raise monies to keep the promotions in the black.

Another abbreviation we should adopt is

CCC. The three "C's" - Communications, Cooperation, Coordination. With these three words, and the resources of all of us together, we can bring the square dance movement back to the levels of the 1960's.

Lead two dancers do the Track II, trailing two dancers Single File Circulate one position to form a momentary Box of Four and do the ANYTHING call.

Because the dancing possibilities are unlimited, dancing examples have not been given.

Track & Trade

Track & Box Circulate

Track & Single Hinge

Track & Partner Tag

Track & Follow Your Neighbor

Track & Cast Off % (to a Diamond)

Track & Scoot Back

Track & Follow Your Neighbor & Spread


